town of Bloomsburg, Pa. On or
about the 27 day of October, to
Charles Marr, Arthur Traub, Ray
Moyer and Charles Savage, all minors;
and on or about January 2, to Ray-
mond Jones, a minor of Bloomsburg,
Pa.

2. By unlawfully furnishing by
gift, sale, or otherwise vinous, spiritu-
ous, malt or brewed liquors on Sun-
days, and among other times on the
following Sundays, to wit: On Novem-
ber 25, 1900, and on Sunday,
December 2, 1900.

3. By unlawfully furnishing by
gift, sale or otherwise, vinous, spiritu-
ous, malt or brewed liquors to persons
of known intemperate habits and to
persons visibly affected by intoxicat-
ing drink, and among others to one
Solomon Bucher on or about the 31
day of December and at various other
times.

4. By unlawfully keeping, main-
taining and permitting to be played
upon the premises and in connection
therewith, the game or amusement of
pool with balls, and other games of
chance, to wit: the throwing of dice
for drinks, and the playing or shoot-
ing of a game of chance known as
"Klondyke," the result or price of for-
feiture in such cases being by drinks,
or vinous, spirituous, malt or brewed
liquors or admixtures thereof.

5. By unlawfully inciting, promot-
ing and encouraging games of chance
and hazard at which spirituous, vino-
us, malt or brewed liquors, are
betted, staked and striven for; and
furnishing wine, spirituous liquors, beer,
cider or other strong drinks to the
persons assembled and attending upon
such games.

That the sales of liquors and the
maintenance of gambling devices as
aforesaid are violations of the law of
this Commonwealth and are not only
injurious to the best interests and
general welfare of this community,
but are particularly demoralizing to
the youth thereof.

Your petitioners therefore pray the
Court to grant a rule on said Enter-
line to show cause why the license
aforesaid shall not be revoked in ac-
cordance with the Act of Assembly in
such case made and provided.
