Estate of Aaron Boone, deceased. Additional exceptions to auditor's account filed by leave of court.

Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, etc. vs. Wm. Krickbaum. Motion to amend answer of respondent filed and allowed.

Relator demurs to the amended answer and prays for judgment of ouster.

The case of the Commonwealth vs. William Krickbaum, proceedings to oust from office, was called up. Judge Herring and District Attorney Harman represent the relator, while Judge H. M. Hinckley, W. H. Rhawn and C. A. Small are looking after Mr. Krickbaum's side of the case.

Arguments on the demurrer were made by Judge Herring and Judge Hinckley. Judge Halsey took the papers and reserved his decision. Should he sustain the demurrer, the relator will have to proceed to take testimony in proof of such things as are denied by Krickbaum. But should the court overrule the demurrer it will probably end the case, and a judgment of ouster will be entered against Mr. Krickbaum.
