In speaking on the subject of fourth-class post offices an official of the department said that few people had any conception of their number and the business done through them. Continuing he gave Mr. Snyder, who lives on the Hess the following interesting data concerning these offices:

'Pennsylvania is the banner state in the number of post offices, having no less than 5255. In fact, this state is way in the van of the states, for New York, the Empire State, has 3735, and is run a close second by Virginia, 3575. Rhode Island has the fewest, 146.

"It will surprise many people to learn that the great Commonwealth of Massachusetts, the eradle of liberty, can boast of but 849 post offices, or within one as many as the state of Washington. Maryland has 1159

"Though North Carolina has within 600 of as many post offices as the state of New York, and nearly four times as many as Massapay \$1000 and over a year. New York has 365, Pennsylvania 315 and Massachusetts 190 offices in the by the way, offices paying \$1000

"And it is the little office which pays from \$1 to \$100 a year which makes the life of a Representative a burden," continued the official, 'Out of the 76,688 post offices in Virginia, . Tennessee, Kentucky, North Carolina, South Carolina and Georgia there are thousands of these little offices. Some will average \$5 and \$6 a year. Some will do no business at all, practically."
