Notable Events of the Week Briefly and Tensely Told.

Henrik Ibsen, the Norwegian dramatist, is ill at Copenhagen.

Antislavery election advocates at Trenton won a preliminary victory.

Four men were killed and two hurt by a falling wall at New Haven.

General Pole-Carew was married to Lady Beatrice Butler in London.

One of the three men in the Cudahy kidnaping plot was arrested at Omaha.

Addicks gained four votes in the Delaware legislature for short term senatorship.

Captain Dyer, who commanded the Baltimore at the battle of Manila, was retired.

An uneasy feeling was reported in Caracas over the government's attitude in the asphalt controversy.

The twenty-fifth annual bench show of the Westminster Kennel club was opened in Madison Square Garden, New York.

Three were killed in a freight wreck on the New York Central at Alken, N. Y.

Severest cold in 50 years in Denmark. Heavy snows and very cold weather throughout Europe.

Senor Carlos Martinez Silva, the new minister from the United States of Colombia to the United States, arrived in Washington.

Francis B. Loomis, the United States minister to Venezuela, is very ill.

Striking potters at Cookeville, O., have organized a pottery company capitalized at \$20,000.

Russia has imposed the maximum tariff duties on American iron and steel goods of all sorts.

New York bank loans increased \$19,000,000 and surplus reserves reduced by \$7,500,000 during the past week.

Miss Frances Roberts' suit to have her father, Dr. C. H. Roberts, a financier, declared insane has been dismissed in the supreme court at Albany.

Mrs. Anna Franz, alleged to be a professional beggar, was arrested in Wall street, New York city, where she exposed a child of 9 months to the rigors of the weather.

The Indianapolis zoo keeper was killed by a Bengal tiger.

Mrs. Stevens, president of the W. C. T. U., endorsed Mrs. Nation.

Twenty-nine persons were injured in a trolley wreck near Cincinnati.

King Edward inspected the Canadian troops returned from South Africa.

Maurice Thompson, the author, died at Crawfordsville, Ind., after a long illness.

The Duke of Connaught was elected grand master of Masons in place of King Edward.

Labor riots continued in Budapest. Three persons were seriously and 15 slightly injured.
