Recruiting Brisk.

WASHINGTON, March 13 .- An increase of over 100 per cent in the number of enlistments for the regular army since the work of recruiting was begun Feb. 8, just after the passage of the army reorganization bill, has encouraged war department officials. They now feel confident there will be no trouble about finding all the men necessary to bring the army up to its full proportion before the date arrives when the volunteers must be mustered out. Adjutant General Corbin has been receiving almost daily reports from the recruiting officers scattered throughout the country show ing the results of their work. At the end of the first week 368 recruits had been obtained. For the week ended March S 736 recruits were obtained.

A Bloody Rain In Stelly.

PALERMO, March 11 .- A strange phenomenon is now being witnessed here. For many hours a heavy red cloud has extended over the city, the sky being a deep red. The rain now falling resembles drops of coagulated blood. This phe-nomenon, which is called "bloody rain," is attributed to dust from the African deserts, transported by the heavy south wind now blowing. A dispatch from Rome says the phenomenon now to be seen there extends also over southern Italy. At Rome the sky is yellow, and at Naples a rain of sand has fallen, the heavens being dark red.

An Opal For the King.

LONDON, March 9.-Mr. Maurice Lyons, a lawyer of Queensland, intends to give King Edward what is believed to be the largest and finest opal in the In the opinion of London lapidaries its only rival in size and beauty is one possessed by Emperor Francis Jo seph. The Lyons gem was shown privately in the office of Sir Horace Tozer, agent general of Queensland, to the oth er Australian agents general. It is oval in shape, two inches long and an inch and a half deep and weighs 250 carats.

Ningara by Searchlight.

NIAGARA FALLS, March 13.-Experts of the General Electric company, with new and powerful apparatus from Schenectady, have tested searchlights on Niagara falls from Falls View. The Michigan Central has long desired to give its patrons a magnificent view of the falls under the electric light operation by the power of the falls itself. The first night's work in spite of disadvantages and the scope to be covered was successful and demonstrated its practicability.

Letter From Washington Found.

KALAMAZOO, Mich., March S .- An autograph letter of George Washington, dated 1766, was found among some waste paper stock at the Bryant paper mill. It was written to Captain James J. Jamie son, a New York merchant, asking for boat freight rates on a quantity of flour Two copies of The Federal Gazette and Baltimore Advertiser over 100 years old and an autograph letter of Robert Morris of Philadelphia, dated 1793, were also found. The waste paper came from Philadelphia.

Schley Ordered Home.

WASHINGTON, March 13.—Orders have been issued at the navy department detaching Rear Admiral W. S. Schley from command of the south Atlantic station and ordering him home for further orders and detaching Rear Admiral B. J. Cromwell from command of the Portsmouth navy yard April 1 and ordering him to command of the south Atlantic station, sailing from New York April 3.

More Chinese Taken.

MALONE, N. Y., March 13 .- The Malone officials have captured 48 Chinamen on the border north of Malone. They are in jail here. They will probably be sent to Ogdensburg. It is said 26 more are coming today.

Grain In Farmers' Hands. WASHINGTON, March 12. - The amount of wheat in farmers' hands on March 1 was 128,100,000 bushels; corn 776,200,000; oats, about 292,800,000.

TERRIFIC EXPLOSION

Eight Killed and Twenty-nine Injured In Chicago.

MANY BUILDINGS WERE SHATTERED.

Bursting Boiler In a Laundry Caused the Damage-The Ruins Being Searched For Dead Bodies. Many Persons Missing.

CHICAGO, March 12.- By the explo sion of the boiler in the Doremus laundry, 458 West Madison street, yesterday 8 people were instantly killed, 29 were injured and several are missing. The cause of the explosion has not

been determined with accuracy as yet and it will probably require an official investigation to settle the matter. It is known that the boiler was old, a second hand affair, and there is no record in the office of the city boller inspector of any inspection having been made within the last year. Pending the verdict of the coroner's jury A. L. Doremus, the pro-prietor of the laundry, is held in custody by the police, and it is the intention of the authorities to institute criminal procoedings against him should the facts brought out at the investigation warrant

such proceedings.

The list of dead and wounded was difficult to secure. Reports of the number of dead in the ruins run all the way from 6 to 20. It is known that 36 employees of the laundry had entered the place before the explosion, because the automatic timekeeper found in the ruins and which was not damaged showed that number of registered arrivals. Two or three were entering at the moment of the explosion. making an approximate total of 40 employees in and around the building. The list of injured includes, however, sever al people residing in the adjoining build ings, nearly all of which were badly damaged. The most conservative estimate by the police concedes that at least three, dead or alive, are still in the ruins.

The explosion was one of almost un-paralleled severity. For nearly two blocks up and down Madison street build-ings were shattered by its force. Practically every window in these two blocks was broken, and the list of persons cut by falling glass will reach to 50 or more. Persons who were in bed in the near vicinity say they were hurled from their beds. Men in barrooms were dashed t the floors and covered with showers of zinss. Passengers in street cars were thrown violently from their seats.

First Shipment of Oil.

AUSTIN, March 12.—A dispatch from Port Arthur says: "The first shipment of oil from the great Lucas gusher has just been made from Port Arthur. It amounted to 6,000 barrels of the crude oil and is consigned to Philadelphia. The pipe line built by Messrs, Guffy & Galey, owners of the Lucas well, will soon be in regular
