LATEST CANAL PLAN

New York Leaders Favor \$26,000,000 Improvement.

GOVERNOR ODELL YIELDS A POINT.

A 450 Ton Barge Canal Will Be Assured by the Additional Expenditure of \$6,000,000—The Route Proposed.

ALBANY, April 3.—In round numbers \$26,000,000 for the improvement of the canals, making a barge canal for 450 ton barges instead of a 300 ton barge canal, as recommended by the governor, is the plan that will be submitted to the people of New York state in November. This is the plan decided upon in a conference between the governor, the state engineer, Speaker Nixon, Leader Alide, Senators Ellsworth and Davis, Assemblyman T. D. Lewis, superintendent of public works, the state comptroller and Attorney General Davies. The bill was handed in today. It is for \$6,000,000 more than Governor Odell first recommended and for \$2,000,000 less than the canal men asked. The difference of \$2,000,000 is made by the plan including the old route from the Hudson to the Mohawk instead of a new river route. The present capacity of the canal is 250 ton boats, and under the \$9,000,000 improvement, the continuation of which was urged by the governor, the gain over the present capacity would be about 70 tons at a cost of \$20,000,000. It was urged that as there could be gained a carrying capacity of from 140 to 200 tons or more by the expenditure of an additional sum of from \$6,000,000 to \$8,000,000 it would be the height of folly not to accept the opportunity in view of the gigantic strides and most sweeping changes which have been made in commercial and industrial conditions since the canal, as enlarged by the Seymour plan, was generally regarded as sufficient. The \$20,000,000 increases the capacity of the canal only 70 tons, while by extending about \$6,000,000 more its capacity will be increased at least 140 tons more, or a total increase of 210 tons, which will reduce the carrying cost to about eight-tenths of a mill per ton for each mile.

Odell's Economic Policy Bears Fruit.

ALBANY, March 30.—Commissioner John McMackin of the new state labor department has dispensed with the services of 18 employees of his department with salaries aggregating \$22,120 annually. This is the first actual reduction in the working force of the state under Governor Odell's economy policy and is made possible by the consolidation of the bureau of labor statistics, the factory department and the board of mediation and arbitration into one department. The removals are to take effect on May 1.

The Molineux Case.

NEW YORK, April 2.—As soon as a copy of the printed record on appeal in the Molineux case is furnished by the printer David B. Hill will begin a study of the testimony preparatory to appearing before the court of appeals. The testimony is voluminous and will not be ready for two weeks at least. Former Senator Hill called on District Attorney Phillips yesterday and had a brief conference regarding the probable time that will be consumed in preparation and argument. In the event of the judgment of the trial court being confirmed General Molineux, the father of the condemned man, will seek to carry the case to the supreme court of the United States. Mr. Hill, it is said, will retain his connection until the last appeal is disposed of.

A Commission Probable.

HAVANA, April 3.—The Cuban constitutional convention met in public session yesterday, but went immediately into executive session. The advocates of sending a commission to Washington were strengthened by the presence of Senors Giberga and Quilez and General Sanguly, the last named resuming his seat in the convention, his resignation not having been accepted. The vote of Monday was reconsidered. Special arrangements will be held today for a further discussion of this question. It is generally thought that a commission will be appointed.

Public Debt Decreased.

WASHINGTON, April 2.—The monthly statement of the public debt issued by the treasury department shows that at the close of business March 30, 1901, the debt, less cash in the treasury, amounted to \$1,007,142,969, which is a decrease as compared with March 1, 1901, of \$18,870,575. The debt is recapitulated as follows: Interest bearing debt, \$1,001,500,410; debt on which interest has ceased since maturity, \$1,770,140; debt bearing no interest, \$382,315,880; total, \$1,385,586,430.

The Passover Feast.

NEW YORK, April 3.—The Hebrew holiday of Passover, a very welcome and joyful holiday to the Hebrew race, will begin with the setting of the sun this evening, and it will continue for one week. The holiday is celebrated to commemorate the deliverance of the children of Israel from the tyranny of Pharaoh about 3,000 years ago and their departure from the land of Egypt after a bondage which lasted for more than four centuries.

Boths and De Wet to Join Forces.

LONDON, April 2.—Dispatches from Cape Town and Brussels tell of General Botha and General De Wet joining a gathering of 13,000 men for operations against General French in the Transvaal. Two hundred Boers have reappeared near Richmond, Cape Colony, and the town guard has been called out to defend the place.

Cyclone in Georgia.

BREWER, Ga., April 3.—A cyclone passed a half mile west of this place yesterday afternoon. Its path was a quarter of a mile wide. The force of the wind was terrific. Turpentine trees for miles along the track of the disturbance were twisted off. Heavy limbs fell a mile from the track of the disturbance.

More Collieries Closed.

SHAMOKIN, April 3.—The Reliance and Alaska collieries, operated by the Philadelphia and Reading Coal and Iron company and employing 2,000 men, have been closed down. This move is the outcome of the men leaving their work on Monday and joining in a celebration at Mount Carmel.

ORIO ELECTIONS.

Johnson Elected Mayor of Cleveland and Jones of Toledo.

CLEVELAND, April 2.—The most interesting municipal election held in this city in years resulted in the election of Tom L. Johnson (Dem.) to the office of mayor over William J. Akers (Rep.) by a plurality that may go as high as 6,000. Only the head of the Republican ticket was defeated, the candidates for the minor offices on that ticket being successful.

In Toledo Mayor S. M. Jones is elected for the third term as a nonpartisan over General W. V. McMaken. Jones' former majority, however, was nearly lost, and he will not have over 1,200 or 1,500 majority.

John N. Hinkle (Dem.) was elected mayor of Columbus over Henry C. Taylor (Rep.) by about 200 plurality.

Michigan State Election.

DETROIT, April 2.—Robert M. Montgomery of Grand Rapids, Republican, has been re-elected justice of the supreme court by about 40,000 majority, and Frank W. Fletcher of Alpena and Henry W. Carey of Manistee, Republican candidates for regents of the State university, have also been elected by a majority almost as large. The vote cast was light, excepting in those cities where there was a fight on some local issue.

Couldn't Live Without a Stomach.

NEW YORK, April 3.—Jacob Wichman, the wealthy German cigar manufacturer, who underwent an operation several days ago for the removal of his stomach on account of a cancerous growth, is dead, his death not being entirely unexpected by the doctors. It was thought that he would live for a time longer at least, but fever and weakness brought about the end. Mr. Wichman was 58 years of age.

Convention Already Signed.

LONDON, April 3.—The Morning Post publishes the following dispatch from Pao-tsing-fu, dated March 31: "Chinese officials here profess to have received information from Li Hung Chang that the Manchurian convention has been signed."
