



> Milkmen Cannot Use It.


Preservation of milk by chemicals injurious to health is now forbidden by law. Among a number of bills signed by the Governor on Saturday, was one to cover this evel. It is made unlawful to use formaline, formeldahyde, sodium fluoride and sodium benzoate, in addition to milk adulterating compounds already under the ban. The penalty for vielation of the law is a fine of \$50 to \$100, or an imprisonment not exceeding sixty days, or both.
