A UNIQUE EXHIBIT.

Valuable Archæological Specimens From Alaska at the Exposition.

The Ethnological Building of the Pan-American Exposition will be full of fine enthological and archæological specimens, and it will be a center of interest for a great many visitors. One of the most unique exhibits in the building is from Alaska. This exhibit is now installed. It occupies the place which had been assigned for the New York State Archaeological dir.

While the Alaskan exhibit is not of greater scientific value than smaller material collected from New York State, it will doubtless be of greater interest to most of the visitors to the Exposition on account of the distance from which it comes and on account of the fact that the archæology of New York State is very similar to that of large portions of this country, while will occupy a quadrant of the ground floor in the Ethnology building.

The southern quadrant of the building is devoted to an exhibit from Mexico, and the eastern quadrant to the exhibits from the other Southern Latin-American countries. Canada and the United States are represented in the balcony. All of the wall cabinets and wall space of the balcony are applied for, and most of the exhibits are in the city.
