The New Fish Law-

The Pennsylvania legislature has made radical changes in the fish law. The most important of these refer to sunfish, black bass, pike, or pickerel, the season for catching which opens on June 15, instead of May 30, as heretofore. The time for closing the season has been extended from December 31 to February 15. The season for catching trout opens the same as before and closes on July 31, fifteen days later than the old law required. It is absolutely forbidden to catch fish at any time in the year, except with rod, hook and line, or with hand or dipsy, the line having not more than three hooks. The old law forbids hand lines.

The fish specified in the new law as game fish are: All species of trout, black bass, rock bass (not rockfish), strawberry or calico bass, pike-perch, or Susquehanna salmon, pike, pick-erel, sunfish, or muskallonge. Rockand may be taken with rod, hook and line, or hand line, at any time of the year. Catfish, eels, suckers and carp, can also be taken with rod, hook and line, at any time of the year.

The new law provides a penalty of man carp in any water of the State, and this fish may not even be used for bait. A heavy penalty is placed on any person who catches black bass less than seven inches long, any trout less than six inches, any pike, pickerel, or pike perch, less than nine inches long. No limit is placed on the size of sunfish.

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
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
