New Insurance Law.

Governor Stone has approved the new insurance law. It provides for closer and better regulations and supervision of insurance companies, incorporated for the purpose of insuring upon the mutual principle against injury, disablement or death, resulting from traveling or general accident resulting from the pursuit of any trade or employment and against injuries of any nature whatsoever causing loss, damage or inability. In order to give the insured greater guarantees than they have had under existing laws, which very often proved entirely worthless, the new act compels insurance companies, except mutual companies, doing only a purely personal accident and health business to accumulate and maintain a reinsurance reserve or emergency fund equal to one-half the premiums on all 1 year to pleased that his boat had an opporturun and a pro rata proportion of all premiums received on risks that have more than one year to run, according to the time of expiration of such risks and said funds shall be known as the "reinsurance reserves." The bill provides that it should be unlawful for such insurance corporations to issue any policy or renewal receipt upon which said corporation may be liable in excess of the sum of \$10,000 on any one accident, and it shall be distinctly stated and expressed in all policies that the entire liability thereunder of said corporation is by the terms of the act restricted to \$10,000 or any one accident. The provisions of the act do not apply to relief associations organized or formed by corporations for the exclusive benefit of their employees, nor to any fraternal association or order that does business under a ritualistic or lodge system and does not employ paid agents. It will afford the insured greater security than they had before. Too often have the insured discovered when too late that their insurance was worthless after years of payment. It wisely leaves untouched the many associations existing all over the State whose aim is not profit, but the actual relief of needy members.

The New Factory Law-

The new factory inspection act passed by the last legislature and approved by Gov. Stone on May 29th. widens the scope of the law and extends the jurisdiction of the inspectors. Section 6 provides that seats must be furnished for girls and women in all factories and mercantile establishments, the latter class of business places now coming under the law. Section 13 makes it obligatory upon the inspector and his deputies to inspect hotels, hospitals, schools, places of amusements etc., which are required to have fire escapes. It would be well, for those concerned to post themselves upon the requirements of the act.

CHINESE PROTOCOL.

Cerents and Flour Placed on the Free List.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13 .- The state department has received a cablegram from Commissioner Rockhill at Peking reporting that the draft of the final protocol has been agreed upon.

A tariff of 5 per cent ad valorem, effective, will be put in force two months after the signing of the final protocol, excepting on goods shipped within ten days after signing, and will continue until the conversion to specific rates has been effected by the expert commission.

The Chinese free list will include rice,

foreign cereals and flour, gold and silver

bullion and coin.

Mr. Rockhill's advices that cereals and flour have been included in the free list of the new Chinese tariff is regarded as an important provision owing to the growth of American exports of wheat and flour to China. In 1899 these amounted to \$2,298,033, which was almost double the shipments of the preceding year. The trade has continued to increase, and the Pacific coast interests have looked forward to supplying China with a considerable part of her consumption of wheat and flour, most of which heretofore has gone from Atlantic ports around the Horn.
