QUIET AT PITTSBURG

Situation In Big Steel Strike Remains Unchanged.

BOTH SIDES CLAIM SOME GAINS.

Each Are Confident of Ultimate Victory - Rumor of Pence Negotiations Denled-Tube Mills Are Tied Up by Strikers.

PITTSBURG, Aug. 21.-Joseph Bish op, the Ohio arbitrator, has appeared here again, but both sides promptly re-pudiated the suggestion that another nove for peace was being considered. The steel managers succeeded in starting the last idle mill at the Clark plant and are evidently planning a series of exten sions at every point where there is a chance of success under existing circum-They will probably start the stances, Star Tin mills in this city and increase the force at the Lindsay & McCatcheon mills. An interesting feature of the fight at the latter mill is contributed by the claim of the strikers that Mrs. Fred Baugh, wife of the superintendent, is es corting the strike breakers to and from the mill. She has always been very popufar with the mill men, and the pickets say they would rather face a regiment of sol-diers than do anything improper in her presence. They say that in peace times she nursed their families and that they simply cannot interfere with her or the men she escorts. The steel managers are also arranging for more men for the Painter and Monessen mills, but have given no indication, of the time that they will move on McKeesport, Wheeling, Newcastle and Bellaire, the strongholds of the strikers. Veryl Preston, represent-ing President Schwab, was here last night and conferred with a number of the lead ing officials of the companies rederated in the steel corporation, and it is understood that general plans for the campaign were discussed. Mr. Preston and the officials whom he met would not talk for publication beyond expressing their satisfac tion with the situation. The strikers meet the movement to re-

open the mills with nonunion men with the claim that it will be simply impossi ble to secure a sufficient number of skilled men to operate them. Their men, they de clare, are standing firm and must be con sulted before the mills run. They say they have the situation well in hand and despite the alleged danger of the strike getting top heavy continue their work of organization with a view of crippling more plants belonging to the corporation. claim that Chicago will in the end They come out and that there is no danger of the Joliet men going back to work, whatever Chicago does. They are still fighting for a foothold in the Carnegie properties. but so far have not shown their hand. Claims as to the advantage at the Duquesne mills are still highly conflicting, but the managers declare with more assurance than ever that the fight there is over and that the Amalgamated association has given up. A show down of hands alone will show the real strength of either side


