The law concerns only attacks made on the Chief Executive as such, for any attack made upon personal grounds would come under state jurisdiction. The law provides that any threat against the President, whether verbal or made in writing, shall be regarded as a felony and punishable by a fine of \$5,000 and any attack upon his person, whether successful or otherwise, shall meet with capital punishment. The bill further provides that accessories before the fact shall be held to an equal responsibility with the direct assailant.
