Anthracite for One Hundred Years.

A banking house in New York has made an estimate of the coal which remains in the anthracite beds of Pennsylvania, and finds that there are still 5,073,775,000 tons unmined. Those beds are, with insignificant exceptions the property of eight railroad corporations, which expect to mine 50,000,000 tons this season. At this rate the coal would last about one hundred years; but the consumption of coal is constantly increasing, and if the estimate of the banking house is correct the anthracite field will be exhausted long before the end of the

century.
