COURT PROCEEDINGS.

In the matter of the lunacy of Nancy Laubach Jury called and came as follows: P. W. Clemens, Henry Fenstermacher, H. A. McHenry, D. H. Fetterolf, W. P. Zehner, Freas Bauman. Hearing in Court Room No. 2.

Commonwealth vs. Adam L. Friday. Charge assault and battery. A true bill. Defendant pleads guilty.

Court sentenced defendant to pay costs of prosecution.

Commonwealth vs. Joseph Calvitch. Assault and battery. A true bill. Defendant pleads not guilty.

Prosecutor John Laurenz, Louis Luconey and D. C. Black sworn. Defendant Joseph Calvitch, E. D. Calvitch, B. Runn and M. Gomiski sworn.

This case was the result of a scrap which had its beginning in Joseph Calvitch's saloon in Centralia one evening in the latter part of September. The prosecutor John Laurenz, it appears, had allowed his congenial inclinations to get the best of him, and entering the restaurant, proceeded to have rough house. He was ordered out, but paid no heed to the command, and was ejected. He claimed to have been hit with a black jack, without just cause or provocation. The case was submitted to the jury without argument.

Commonwealth vs. W. F. Adams. Embezzlement. Case continued by agreement.

Commonwealth vs. J. H. Powlus. Larceny. Defendant pleads guilty. The defendant told how and what prompted him to commit the crime.

Some pigs were on the verge of starvation, and in order to appease their hunger, he took some corn and fed them. Since his confinement in jail, he had experienced a turn of mind, and by the help of God he proposed to live an upright life. His Honor, in view of the defendant's good resolution, suspended sentence.

Commonwealth vs. Cleveland Coleman. Charge breaking and entering. A true bill. Defendant pleads guilty.

Court sentenced defendant to pay costs of prosecution; that he be committed to the care and custody of the managers and trustees of the Reformatory at Huntingdon until discharged by them or due course of law; the Sheriff to conduct him thither within ten days and be allowed one assistant.

Commonwealth vs. Peter Anderson. Charge larceny. A true bill. Defendant pleads guilty and asks the mercy of the Court.

Grand Jury makes the following returns:

Commonwealth vs. Aaron Trexler. Charge assault and battery, etc. Not a true bill. Prosecutor Charles Ernest to pay costs.

Commonwealth vs. Charles Ernest. Charge assault and battery and assault and battery with intent. A true bill.

Court sentenced defendant, Charles Ernest to pay costs of prosecution, give bail to Sheriff for payment of same within ten days.

Commonwealth vs. John Fry. Charge F. & B. A true bill. Nolle pros. allowed upon payment of costs.

Commonwealth vs. Charles H. Ernest. Charge assault and battery, and assault and battery with intent. A true bill. Recognizance forfeited and Court directs bench warrant to issue.

Commonwealth vs. Joseph Calvitch. Charge assault and battery. A true bill. Verdict not guilty. Prosecutor Frank Laurenz and defendant Joseph

Calvitch to each pay one-half the costs.

Court sentenced prosecutor, Frank Laurenz, and defendant, Joseph Calvitch, to each pay one-half the costs of prosecution and give bail to Sheriff for payment of same within ten days.

Commonwealth vs. Peter Anderson. Charge larceny. A true bill. Defendant pleads guilty.

Court sentenced defendant to pay costs of prosecution, a fine to Commonwealth of \$300, undergo imprisonment at separate and solitary confinement in the Eastern Penitentiary for a period of one year, the Sheriff to conduct you thither within ten days and be allowed one assistant.
