The "handmaiden of protection," as Mr. Roosevelt has termed reciprocity, has been treated very cavalierly by Mr. Payne and his Ways and Means Committee this week. "No compromise" has been the motto to which the republican members of that committee have strictly adhered in framing their bill governing the Philippine tariff regulations. An earnest effort was made by Mr. Russell of Connecticut to secure some concessions looking to the establishment of more extensive trade relations between the United States and the islands but the foes of Cuban reciprocity feared that any concession to the Philippines would be used as a precedent in the contention for reciprocity with the former and their influence with the majority of the committee prevailed.

Mr. Russell, who has a very level head on his shoulders, attached great importance to the representations of Secretary Root that the Philippine trade was being absorbed by countries other than the United States, notably Germany and the British colonies. Realizing that the time would come when the people would find the burden of maintaining a large army in the islands irksome and would call upon his party to show the increased trade which was supposed to compensate for the expense, he made an eloquent appeal for discriminating duties, but his colleagues had ears only for the siren voices of the Oxford lobby and cloaking their refusal behind an alleged loyalty to the "open door policy," they declined to entertain his propositions.

The bill, as presented by the Ways and Means Committee, provides for the application to Philippine commerce of the provisions of the Dingley bill and the Taft Commission bill, with the proviso that all the duties collected on Philippine goods imported into the United States shall be converted into the Philippine treasury. The measure also provides that until January 1905 foreign vessels may engage in commerce between the United States and the islands and that the same tonnage dues will be exacted on ships carrying passengers and freight that are now collected from foreign vessels entering the United States.

On Tuesday the House had the pleasure of listening to a lengthy speech from Representative Galusha A. Grow, ex speaker, on the subject of legislation for the Philippines, in which Mr. Grow spent upwards of an hour in demonstrating to himself and the members of the republican side of the chamber that Congress had power to legislate for the Philippines. Most of the democrats were out in the lobbies and committee rooms.

In the Senate, Senator Lodge has been working faithfully to explain away all the objections which have been raised against the Hay-Pauncefote treaty. He has not succeeded very well, but the objections are not of a particularly serious nature and as practically all of the senators are of the opinion that there is nothing more that Secretary Hay can do, they will ratify it as soon as they have had time to air their objections. The cost of the canal, as provided for by the appropriation carried by Senator Morgan's bill, is \$180,000,000.

Mr. Lodge's efforts to defend the treaty will prove a sine cure compared with the effort he will have to put forth to secure the ratification of any reciprocal treaty with Cuba. Mr. Roosevelt is counting on him to effect something in the nature of a concession for Cuba, but it is doubtful if the "weighty reasons of morality and interest" to which Mr. Roosevelt referred in his message will have much influence against the "Beet Sugar Convention" which is holding its meetings, no one knows where, in Washington.

the Senator has them all at his tongue's end. He can show that under the Spanish regime a tax of eighty mills on the pound barred Cuban sugar from the Spanish markets and precipitated the revolt which we interfered to quell and that now that we have expelled Spain we propose and are taxing Cuban sugar ninety-five mills per pound to prevent its coming into the markets of the United States. He can further show that we are excluding Cuban sugar from American markets to protect an industry that does not produce over one fourth of the sugar we consume and that we are still obliged to buy over 1,600,000 tons in the markets of the world. The Senator and the President have sat up nights acquiring full possession of the facts but there are times when other things than facts talk.

Senator Lodge has introduced a bill in the Senate providing for the erection of an office for the President immediately South of the Treasury building with a view to restoring the historic White House to the purpose for which it was originally intended, a residence for the President and his family. The bill provides for a building two stories in height to cost \$1,000,000. As Senator Lodge is the author of the bill it is assumed that it meets with the approval of the President and it is regarded as to Mr. Roosevelt's credit that he should desire to preserve the White House, with all its historic associations, as the presidential residence.

There was a good deal of amusement this week over the flying visit which Governor Yates of Illinois paid to Washington. He frankly acknowledged that he came uninvited and it is rumored that he was made, quite unconsciously, the tool of the Lorimer faction in the Illinois senatorial fight.

An example of the very exceptional ability which Mr. Roosevelt is displaying in the political field was afforded by the announcement that Mr. Weneke, a gentleman who voted for Palmer and Buckner in 1896, is to be appointed to the surveyorship of the port of St. Louis, a place which both Secretary Hitchcock and the Kerens factions have been so long quarrelling. The announcement is not official, but was made by Mr. William M. Reedy, a gentleman for whom the President sent when the Hitchcock and Kerens factions became a source of annoyance.

The announcement of Senator Foraker of Ohio that he will "stand for Roosevelt" in the next national convention is considered excellent politics on Mr. Foraker's part, as he is placing himself on the right side of the inevitable, and is regarded as anything but an extension of the olive branch to his colleague, Senator Hanna.

New Bridge at Lewisburg. The proposition to erect an inter-county bridge, between Northumberland and Union counties, at Lewisburg, under the provisions of the Focht law, has been approved by the State Board of Property, which is made up of Attorney General Elkin, Secretary of State Griest, General Latta and Major Isaac B. Brown. The proposed structure will cost \$1,000,000. The State will bear one-half the expense and the other half will be borne by the counties in proportion to population. The population of Union county is about 13,000, and of Northumberland county, 91,000, so that Northumberland county's share will amount to about \$400,000 and Union county's to \$100,000.

Pensions for Reading Railroad Men. The Reading railway has inaugurated a pension system for faithful employes. Notices were posted along the line and in all shops of the company, stating that President Baer has been given authority to retire all men who have been continuously in the company's service 50 years or more. Their names will be retained on payrolls and pensions will be fixed on the following basis: 50 per cent of wages received at the time of their retirement; in case this does not amount to \$30 per month they will be given that sum.

Will Double Track the Road. It is reported that the double-tracking of the Philadelphia and Reading railroad—the work of which was discontinued eight or ten years ago—will be finished in the near future. This is made necessary by the large amount of business of the New York Central. The completion of the West Branch line of the Central will mean still more business. It is said that the improvements on the Williamsport line of the Reading will be authorized at the next meeting of the board of directors.

New Telephone Connection. The Watsontown Exchange Connected With Williamsport. The United Telephone & Telegraph Co. has made connections at the Watsontown exchange with the line which has just been completed between Watsontown and Williamsport, via Muncy, and with the line running into Danville; the junction of the lines being at the town of Comley, in Moutour county, some three miles east of Turbotville. At Williamsport the service is known as the North and West Branch company, but it is all under the same management and the corporate name of the parent company is that known at Watsontown, the United Telephone and Telegraph company, with headquarters at 112 Broad street, Philadelphia, who now own and operate some fifteen or more companies, formerly under separate management. The United Telephone and Telegraph company have already installed and have in use in their consolidated system many thousand phones, and are adding daily to the equipment and efficiency of their lines a number of which were found not to be in a very satisfactory condition, but all are now being rapidly improved under the new condition of things.

Constables Don't Like It. Sheriff-elect Sam Deitrick, of Northumberland, says his home paper, the Mt. Carmel News, has made an announcement that is causing consternation among the constables of that county. The law allows the Sheriff to serve all court subpoenas, etc. But for years it has been the custom of the various sheriffs to allow the constables to serve these papers and get the fees. A constable is allowed mileage of six cents per mile, circular, and fifty cents for the first name and fifteen cents for each additional name, for serving these papers. This puts several thousand dollars yearly into the pockets of the constables, and the law allows the sheriff and his deputies to do the work and pocket the fees. It is this work that the newly elected sheriff proposes to do, and, in so doing, increases his fees very materially. He is allowed ten cents per mile where the constable is allowed only six. This move on Mr. Deitrick's part will, it is observed, increase the cost of serving subpoenas forty per cent.

The Rockville Bridge. The Longest Stone Arch Bridge in the World. Every effort is to be made to place the new Rockville bridge in operation within the next month or two. Monday the contractors began dumping cinder on the bridge, preparatory to tracking the structure, and on December 8 all the men now at work on the Duncannon and river improvements were moved to Marysville. These men were put to work on the big improvements at that place and the approaches on both the eastern and western ends of the bridge. The cut on the western side of the river is about half completed and the eastern approach has not been commenced.

The trial of John S. Gulick has again been continued in the Sunbury court. It will be remembered that he murdered his mother and brother last summer. The defense will be insanity, as a rule has been asked for by Gulick's counsel to provide means for the employment of an expert to examine the mental condition of the prisoner.
