TEN BURNED TO DEATH.

Notable Events of the Week Briefly Fearful Accident In a Pittaburg Iron Furnnce.

PITTSBURG, Dec. 20.-Ten men were burned to death and four injured by an explosion of gas at the Soho furnace of Jones & Laughlin, limited, in Second avenue, near Brady street. The explosion was caused by a slip in the furnace, the gas and flames beiching upward through the bell. The men were on the furnace platform, eightyfive feet above the ground.

There were nineteen men on the furnace platform when the explosion occurred. Fifteen of them were caught in the flames, two of whom escaped with slight injuries. The other four were the regular men employed as top fillers, who escaped without injury.

The explosion was caused by the gas becoming incased in a crust of cinder forming at the bottom of the furnace.

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING AND EM POWERING W. R. CHAPIN AND CHARLES J. ROGERS AND T. W. HAINES OR THEIR GRANTERS OR ASSIGNS, TO CONSTRUCT, MAINTAIN, AND OPERATE A SYSTEM OF WATER WORKS IN THE BOROUGH OF ORANGEVILLE, FOR THE PURPOSE OF SUPPLYING WATER TO FIRMS, COR-PORATIONS, INDIVIDUALS AND CITI-ZENS THEREOF.

Be it ordained and enacted by the Borough Council of the Borough of Orangeville and it is hereby ordained and enacted by authority of

Section 1. That W. R. Chapin and Charles J. Rogers and T. W. Haines or their grantees or assigns, be and are hereby authorized and empowered to construct, maintain and operate system of water works in the Borough of Orangeville, to supply water to firms, corporations, individuals and citizens thereof, and for that purpose to lay and maintain the necessary pipes, joints, connections, etc., under the several Streets, Avenues, lanes and alleys, of the said Borough of Orangeville; subject to the conditions and restrictions hereinafter con tained, viz:

Section 2. That said work shall be don under the supervision of the proper Borough authorities, and the services of the Borough Engineer when called upon by Council in this behalf shall be paid by the said W. R. Chapin and Charles J. Rogers and T. W. Haines or their grantees or assigns.

Section 3. That the said pipes, joints, connections, etc., shall not be laid or constructed so as to obstruct, impede or interfere with the free flow or passage of water, in, through, over, or wa'er course; nor so as to interfere with or obstruct the convenient use of the streets, avenues, lanes and alleys of the said Borough, nor so as to interfere with or damage private property, or of any corporation in said Borough. Work to be begun by said grantees within six months and the said water works and plant to be in full operation within one year from the date of the passing of this Ordinance or the franchises nereby granted are forfeited.

Section 4 That the said W. R. Chanin and Charles J. Rogers and T. W. Haines or their grantees or assigns, shall repair and make good all damage or injury to the streets, avenues lanes and alleys of the said Borough, and side walks thereof, and shade trees thereupon, used by them for the purposes aforesaid.

Section 5. That the said W. R. Chapin and Charles J. Rogers and T. W. Haines or their grantees or assigns, shall so lay and maintain their pipes, joints, connections, etc., so as not to interfere with the pipes, joints, connections, etc., of the citizens and the municipality, now having pipes, joints, connections, etc., under the several streets, lanes and alleys of the said Borough.

Section 6. That the said W. R. Chapin and Charles J. Rogers and T. W.
