Notable Events of the Week Briefly and tersely told. Elbridge S. Brooks, noted as an author, died at Somerville, Mass.

Former President Cleveland is able to leave his room, but is in a weak condition.

The British have defeated the commands of Botha and Opperman, but suffered severely themselves.

For the first time in the history of the United States senate the chaplain prayed for the newspaper men.

At Logansport, La., fire burned the business portion of the town, consisting of thirty-three buildings; total loss, \$125,000; insurance, \$75,000.

Tuesday, Jan. 7. Hole-in-the-Wall, Wyo., a refuge for outlaws, is to be blasted out.

The Liberty bell has left Philadelphia for the Charleston exposition.

Six candidates have announced themselves in the New Jersey senatorship fight.

The Colorado State bank, one of the oldest institutions in Grand Junction, has closed its doors.

Nineteen men were drowned off Aveiro, Portugal, by the sinking of two steamers which came into collision.

Monday, Jan. 6. The First National bank of Glassport, Pa., was robbed of \$3,000.

Forty-nine persons were arrested in Spain, suspected of hatching anarchist plots.

Two men were drowned in the Hudson near Poughkeepsie by skating into an airhole.

At Hartford, Conn., four of a family were asphyxiated in their home by escaping gas from a defective meter.

The one hundredth anniversary of the organization of Bethesda Welsh Congregational church was fittingly celebrated at Utica, N. Y.

Saturday, Jan. 4. Lord Strathcona gave \$125,000 to Aberdeen university.

A Missouri pastor advises women to make proposals of marriage.

Rev. Dr. Joseph Pullman was reported very ill at Stamford, Conn.

F. O. Briggs of Trenton accepted appointment as state treasurer of New Jersey.

The National City bank of New York loaned \$10,000,000, breaking the record of months.

An attempt to assassinate Lord Milner, British high commissioner in South Africa, was reported.

Friday, Jan. 3. A violent blizzard raged in northern Michigan.

The funeral of Governor Rogers of Washington occurred at his home in Payallup.

W. Murray Crane was inaugurated governor of Massachusetts for the third time.

A woman and her two children were burned to death in a hotel fire at Searchlight, Nev.

Governor Odell granted a respite of three months to John Schmidt, the Claverack (N. Y.) murderer who is confined in Clinton prison under sentence to be electrocuted.

Thursday, Jan. 2. The San Francisco mint converted \$51,072,500 from bullion into coin during 1901.

A Dublin dry goods warehouse was gutted by fire. The damage is estimated at \$650,000.

The Argentine government has ordered the construction in Italy of two armored vessels.

A severe northwest gale raged along the Atlantic coast, doing considerable damage to shipping.

At the annual sparrow hunt of Pleasant township, in Illinois, four tons of sparrows were killed.

Rear Admiral and Did Not Know It. BOSTON, Jan. 4.—Information from Washington shows that Captain Richard F. Leary, U. S. N., who died at Chelsea a few days ago, died a rear admiral without being conscious of the fact. It was a promotion that he had looked for, and it is said to be the one thing that he worried over during his last moments.

The appointment was made the day before he died, but it was only when his brother-in-law, Dr. Fairfax Irwin, returned from Captain Leary's funeral at Annapolis to the marine hospital at Chelsea that the appointment was found.

Big Price For Hereford Bull. CHICAGO, Jan. 8.—The Hereford bull Perfection, 92891, has been sold for \$9,000 at the Union stockyards, Chicago. This is the highest price ever paid in America for a Hereford and the highest price in recent years for a bull or cow of any breed.

Perfection was the champion Hereford bull of the International Live Stock exposition in December. He headed the list of fifty-six animals sold by Thomas Clark of Beecher, Ill., and was purchased by Gilbert H. Hoxie, vice president of the Malloy Live Stock Commission company of Chicago.

Daring Bank Theft. ST. LOUIS, Jan. 8.—Six masked men entered the National Stockyards bank, north of East St. Louis, Ill., and after capturing and gagging the two watchmen and firemen at the plant and blowing open the vaults with dynamite secured \$5,000 in coin and currency, with which they decamped. For nine hours they were at work on the vaults without being interfered with.

Crude Rubber Company Fails. NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—The Crude Rubber company, incorporated under the laws of Virginia in February, 1897, and having its offices at 25 Broadway, this city, has gone into the hands of a receiver. According to trustworthy reports, its assets are about \$3,000,000 and its liabilities about \$3,000,000 in addition to indenturements and guarantees of about \$2,000,000.
