J. entertained the audience on the subject of the San Jose scale. Mr. Frank Colley sang a tenor solo, and then Herbert W. Collingwood told "How New York eats fruit." His speech was entertaining, and he fully impressed his hearers with the fact that he and the Ben Davis apple were not on speaking terms.

Wednesday's sessions were interestingly occupied and in the evening the hall was again crowded. Music was furnished by the Normal orchestra, and Mr. Frank Eyer sang a solo, all ot which was much enjoyed. Dr. J. P. Welsh spoke on Home Attractions in the absence of the regular speaker, and J. L. Dillon read a paper on Cultivation of Soil. Prof. Craig of Cornell gave an illustrated lecture on Orchard Cover Crops.
