WASHINGTON.

From our Regular Correspondent. Washington, June 30, 1902.

Republican senators and members are to be treated to a new experience during the coming campaign and many of them do not relish the prospect. The President has announced to his friends that he has not given up the fight for Cuban reciprocity and that he intends to go out into the states whose members of Congress have opposed his Cuban policy and preach his doctrine of reciprocity with Cuba to the great discomfiture of those members and senators who will stand for re-election.

Throughout the past session republican senators and members have grown accustomed to being sent for from the White House and to being scolded and upbraided, but it never entered their heads that their "strenuous" President would go even further and ally himself with forces bent on their destruction in their own states and now that they are face to face with that prospect they are aghast.

With the passage of the Spooner amendment for the Nicaraguan canal bill last Thursday, the Senate completed all the more important work before it and is now "killing time" pending adjournment. The bill providing for the Appalachian Forest Reserve was passed this week and a day set for the consideration of the Omnibus State hood bill, Dec. 10 being named, these being the only important matters with which the upper chamber had to deal.

Tuesday in the House of Representatives marked the close of general debate on the Philippine bill and was notable for the eloquent arrangement of the republican party for its Philippine policy, delivered by Representative Williams of Mississippi, whose oratory crowded the chamber even drawing in all of his opponents. Mr. Williams characterized the republican interpretation of the treaty of Paris as supporting the principal "that the despot had the right to sell the independence of, and nationality of, a free and independent people to a free republic."

Senator Foraker has planned a very delightful junket, at public expense of course, and hopes to get his resolution through the Senate during the closing hours when bills of this description are not too closely scrutinized. Mr. Foraker proposes that the committee on Cuba and Porto Rico visit those islands before the next session "in order that the members may legislate for the islands more intelligently."
