
DITCHES AND DRAINS.

Simple Apparatus by Which Any Bright Farmer Can Easily Obtain a Proper Grade.

A device for assisting in getting the grade while digging drains is described by H. W. Smith, Somerset county, Me. I took a piece of board a, a, eight feet long, seven inches wide, and nailed on two three-cornered pieces, b, b, cutting out the section of the board between them, as shown in the illustration. Then I nailed a piece of lath across the tops of the three-cornered pieces. A piece of clapboard, d, three feet long, was sharpened nearly to a point on the thin side and nailed diagonally to the side of the eight-foot board, thin edge down, so that the

point of the elapboard would be about 20 inches above the center of the lath. A plumb line and bob is suspended from the point above the center of the lath. If the lower edge of the board is straight and placed in a level position the line will hang at right angles with it. Have the edge of the lath planed. Take a sharp pencil and mark each side of the line and cut a notch on the lath. To illustrate the use of the device, when the board is level, if a two-inch block is put under one end and a notch cut behind the line, the plumb line will indicate the

As western competition becomes more intense, western farmers and the congressmen who represent them demand expensive irrigation and more free farms, while eastern farmers have failed to ask for government supplies of free fertilizers; and eastern gardeners have made no demand for appropriations for plant houses and other aids to production .- Country Gentleman.

WASHINGTON.

From our Regular Correspondent. Washington, July 7, 1902.

The Fifty-seventh Congress has comelections. Between their subserviency the presidential possibilities of 1904, their party has had control, not only of both branches of the legislative but of the executive department of the government as well, into a sad fiasco. Of the legislation recommended by Mr. Roosevelt, but few measures have been enacted and most of those were leaders and only by the aid of democratic votes.

The Isthmian Canal bill, which has never been a party measure has been passed, it is true, although the influences which prompted the substitution of the Spooner resolution, providing for the selection of the Panama route. are well known and it is further known that none will be more sadly disappointed than they if the examination of the Attorney-General reveals furnished by the Panama Canal company. The passage of the Hansbrough Newlands Irrigation bill was opposed by Speaker Henderson, Representatives Daizell, Payne, Grosvenor and other republican leaders and only a coalition of democratic and republican members secured its consideration and passage by the House. The Philippine bill is a sad makeshift which accomplishes nothing except extension of the powers of the Philippine Commisston. The republicans, who have long

boasted of the solidity and harmony of their party on the currency question were obliged, at the eleventh hour, to eliminate the coinage provisions because the republican members of the Senate and the House could not reach an agreement on either a silver or a

The breach in the republican ranks made by the opposing trusts in the Cuban Reciprocity contest is too recent to require more than mention here. Even the urgent special message of the President was fruitless in the face of the power of the trusts. Mr. Roosevelt's earnest recommendations in regard to governmental supervision and publicity for the trusts fell upon deaf ears, or rather upon ears which had for so long listened to the siren voice of the great monopolies that they recognized no other. Mr. Roosevelt's recommendations that the principle of general reciprocity ne extended received no consideration. The tariff protected interests care not for reciprocity and the interests of the people, the consumers, are of small mport to the type of statesmen which republican conventions select for Congress. The Department of Commerce advocated by the President came to naught and the same is true of the anti-anarchy bill which the necessity for which he so ably set forth.

But there was one accomplishment in which the Fifty-seventh Congress failed not, the expenditure of the public funds. Even according to their own financier, Senator Allison, the appropriations for the session aggregate \$800,193.837 nor does this include the contracts authorized and which are the equivalent of so many promissory notes which must be paid at some future date, and which, according to Representative Livingston, of the Appropriations Committee, amount to \$259,373,215. The total appropriations of the session correctly stated, therefore, will amount to \$1,-059,567,052. In view of the estimate of Mr. Cannon, made June roth, that the revenues for the current fiscal year would amount to but \$639,000,-000, the outlook is not encouraging. That this kind of financiering will be countenanced by the people or that the voters at the fall elections will endorse the party which has so recklessly distributed the public funds is hardly to be expected.

Tuesday morning's Cabinet meeting was the most interesting that has been held for a long time. The practical close of Congress had removed from the realm of uncertainty a number of important matters and Ricomsburg that fact, together with the approaching departure of the President, made it necessary to consider a number of important subjects.
