WASHINGTON.

From our Regular Correspondent.

Washington, July 31, 1902.

"The history of the first session of the fifty seventh Congress has been typical of the history of the republican and the democratic parties from time immemorial," said a gentleman at democratic headquarters today. "Throughout the session," he continued, "the democrats have worked for principals, the republicans for votes. the democrats, realizing that it was class legislation of the worst form, vigorously opposed it. The republicans, appreciating that it would make votes in the rural districts, supported it. They won in Congress. It remains to be seen whether they can win out of Congress. When the antianarchy bill was reported in the Senate, the democrats saw in it a menace to individual liberty and a violation of the principles of the constitution and of the spirit of the Declaration of Independence. Generally speaking, they voted against it. The to thrash the whole bunch."-N.
