Strike Situation Growing Serious.

The great coal strike is apparently growing more serious with each succeeding day. Wild scenes of disorder marked the last forty-eight hours in the coal mining towns of law's majesty. Soldiers are now encamped in every valley and the army is the largest on duty since the Homestead strike of 1892.
