Scholarships at Lehigh University.

Lehigh University, situated at South Bethlehem, Pa., has placed at the disposal of the Principal of course of the University, entitling the holder to free tuition for a college course of four years beginning September 1903. This scholarship is to be awarded to some student of extraordinary ability and scholastic attainments.

At the annual meeting of the State Board of Health, held at Harrisburg last week, Secretary Lee presented a report which showed, among other things, that there are 87 points in the state at which small pox exists and that the increase in the number of cases since Aug. 1 has been over 50 per cent., monthly. It was ordered that every effort possible should be made to secure from the next legislature an appropriation of \$50,000 as an emergency fund to guard against epidemics.
