A New Bill.

The bill introduced in the State Legislature by Senator Harrison, making wife desertion a misdemeanor punishable by imprisonment not exceeding one year, or a fine not exceeding \$100, or both, is called to the attention of all charity workers and thoughtful people.

Fow Ballot Reform Bill.

WHEELER'S GREAT CLAIM.

\$60,000,000 Suit Against Reading Co. Comes up in June.

O. H. Wheeler, of Williamsport, who has instituted against the Philadelphia and Reading Coal and Iron Company the "greatest suit in the history of Pennsylvania," a suit on the outcome of which "depends the title of more than half the properties in Pennsylvania, New York and the Virginias," is in Sunbury again, says Tuesday's Sunbury Item.

He freely tells the story of his long struggle against "the soulless corporation," which for many years has grown rich at the expense of him and his associates in the Robert Morris Land and Coal Company.

Wheeler bases his claim on the original grant of the land by the Commonwealth to one Robert Morris in 1793. The grant included 154 warrants to 61,500 acres in Lycoming, Northumberland, Columbia and Schuylkill counties then valuable as timber tracts.

When Wheeler came into possession of the property, or at least into possession by deed, he organized the Robert Morris Land and Coal Company, composed of twenty-six men, many of them state officials, who are now deceased.

Wheeler instituted suit in 1889, and as he claimed he could not get justice in local courts in which the corporation practiced subordination, he transferred his suits to Pittsburg and later to other places.

Wheeler is an old man, several years over the four-score mark. He says he has been a lawyer since 1841, when he was admitted to the bar, and that during the war he bore dispatches from Governor Curtin to President Lincoln.
