Roosevelt, Taking Daily Horseback Rides and Long Walks Over Mountain Trails, Is In the Best of Health.

CINNABAR, Mont., April 15.-President Roosevelt has broken camp and is slowly working his way to Major Pitcher's headquarters at Fort Yellowstone. He is expected to arrive at Yancey's today and to reach the fort some time tomorrow. He will remain there one day and then will start for Norris, where the geysers are.

There is a good deal of snow between the fort and Norris, and the engineer corps is at work opening the road. Word received from the president is to the effect that he is in the best of health and thoroughly enjoying his outing. In addition to horseback riding, he takes long walks over the mountain

Notwithstanding reports to the contrary, the president has not fired a shot at a mountain lion and has no intention of doing so. It is estimated that there are 500 of these animals in the park, and they are killing large quantities of deer and elk. A determined effort is being made to exterminate them, and "Buffalo" Jones, the game warden of the park, with his scouts, is slaying them on every possible occasion. Mr. Jones has offered to round up a lion or two for the president to shoot at, but the latter has declined the offer.

TO PROBE ALL CHARGES.

Postmaster General Payne Says Investigation Will Proceed.

WASHINGTON, April 14.-Postmaster General Payne has given out a statement in which he announces that the investigation of the affairs of the postoffice department will be continued and that any parties found guilty of wrongdoing will be dealt with summarily.

The whole administration of the postoffice department is made subject to the investigation under Postmaster General Payne's directions, and every charge will be probed thoroughly and the inquiry made as thoroughly as the department's most expert inspectors can make it.

At the same time Mr. Payne's purpose is to give fair and just treatment to all concerned and not to act arbitrarily and with undue haste.

North Accepts Census Post. BOSTON, April 15.-S. N. D. North of this city has decided to accept the directorship of the United States census bureau, the position recently offered him by President Roosevelt. The matter was left to the executive committee of the National Association of Wool Manufacturers, to which organization Mr. North felt that he owed prior allegiance, and they have released him from his obligations as secretary, with highly commendatory resolutions.

New Weather Service Cable, WASHINGTON, April 15.-The landing and successful operation of a government cable connecting San Francisco and the Farallone islands, thirty miles outside the Golden Gate, is announced in an official message just received by Chief Willis L. Moore of the weather bureau. This important extension of the weather service was authorized by congress as the result of repeated representations from the maritime interests of San Francisco.

Ailes, assistant secretary of the treasury, severed his connection with the department today to accept the vice presidency of the Riggs National bank of Washington, one of the oldest and most prominent financial institutions in this section of the country. #### WASHINGTON.

From our Regular Correspondent. Washington, April 13, 1903

There is no longer any question of the tariff policy of the Administration nor of the platform on which the President expects to make his campaign for re-election. From a member of the President's Cabinet your correspondent learns the following facts. Ever since he became President Mr. Roosevelt has believed that certain of the Dingley duties were too high and should be revised. This was evidenced by his advocacy of a commission to make recommendations to Congress regarding necessary tariff changes. When Governor Cummins of Iowa came to Washington some impressed with the former's exposition of the "Iowa Idea." Before he left Washington, however, Mr. Roosevelt conferred with many of the leaders of his party. They urged upon him the impossibility of securing any reduction of the tariff because of the uncompromising attitude of a number of republican senators, probably eighteen. They pointed out that an attempt at revision would disturb business and, however beneficial the result might eventually prove, the immediate consequence would be the defeat of the party which undertook to change the tariff schedules. After listening to these arguments Mr Roosevelt was reluctantly, but none the less certainly, convinced.

Just before the President went west he presented the situation to the Cabinet saying that he feared tariff revision would be impracticable. This view was heartily endorsed by every member save Secretaries Shaw and Wilson who expressed no opinion. It was then and there determined that Secretary Shaw should, at Peoria, and Secretary Root should. at Boston, announce the key-note of the campaign, as the "stand pat" policy. The President also determined to make his position clear at Minneapolis. Senator Allison, who was a party to the agreement, also stated that he would make public his approval of the plan in the near future. This policy has been carried out in detail, Senator Allison having given an interview to a western newspaper "knocking" the "lowa idea." The President read and approved the Shaw and Root speeches. In his own speech it was noticed by careful observers that he did not deprecate tariff revision with the force he usually exhibits in discussing public questions and in view of the inside history of the situation the reason is plain. Mr. Roosevelt's heart is not with the "stand pat" policy. He believes in a revision of the tariff and has adopted the contrary position only as a matter of expediency. Secretary Wilson believes it is too early to adopt such a policy. He regards the Cummins faction in Iowa as more powertul than it is believed to be by other members of the Cabinet and is followng his usual policy of "sitting on the fence."

Great surprise is expressed at the fact, which has just leaked out, that Secretary Hay has pledged the United States to pay the expense incurred by the Panama Canal Company in maintaining its concession, which necessitates the continuous excavation of a minimum amount of earth. In order to comply with the terms of this concession the French company now has employed a force consisting of 160 engineers, 45 surgeons, and approximately 1,500 men. The expense of maintaining this force, for which Mr. Hay has made the United States liable, is estimated at \$5,000 per day. It is largely with a view to inspecting the work being done that Admiral
