BRAZIL CLAIMS ACRE ARAB HOSPITALITY.

Actual Possession Strengthens Her Position.

BOLIVIA OFFERS NO OPPOSITION.

At the Outset the Brazilian Government Only Approved a Foreign Syndicate at Hendquarters of the Amazon.

WASHINGTON, April 22 .- Significant information has reached the state department from official sources to the effect that Brazil is no longer contenting herself with a protest against the establishment of a foreign syndicate of great power on the head waters of the Amazon, but has now come forward with a vigorous claim, backed by possession, that the Acre territory is actually her own.

Brazil started out, it is stated, by urging only that the Acre territory was in litigation. This contention was em- after the Arab custom, each tribe ocbodied in a treaty which was withdrawn by the Rio government before which were droves of richly harnessed ratification. From the date of withdrawal Brazil has been increasing her claims until she now has obtained practical recognition of it by the agreement of Bolivia to the temporary occupation of the region by Brazilian troops pending the final settlement of the dispute by negotiation.

Of considerable assistance to Brazil in the assumption of this advanced position with respect to the Acre question has been the fact that the territory in dispute is inhabited solely by Brazilians. Surrender of all the Bolivian garrisons stationed in Acre was accomplished by the insurrection there last winter, and upon the establishment of the modus vivendi Placido Castro, the revolutionary leader, offered his services to the federal authorities and since has acted as the governor of the district pending the arrival of government troops. FRANCE DECORATES THE LEADERS.

Desert Tribesmen of El Kreider Gather in Thousands For the Grand "Diffs," or Banquet. and Native Dances.

EL KREIDER, Algeria, April 22.-President Loubet participated here in a veritable durbar of the nomadic tribesmen of the desert. The tribesmen gathered in thousands from all parts of southern Algeria for a ceremony of oriental splendor.

It was held on a vast plateau. Here the tribesmen assembled from all quarters, some of them having journeyed 300 or 400 miles across the desert. Their tents were arranged in circles cupying a large circle, in the center of camels. The chiefs were mounted on horses, but the tribesmen were ou camels and formed great caravans. Over 8,000 men participated in the gathering.

A superb tent of camel hair fabrics and Arab tapestries had been erected for President Loubet. As each tribe passed in review its chief dismounted and paid homage to the president of France, who distributed decorations to the principal leaders.

The ceremonies were brought to a conclusion by a grand "diffa." or Arab banquet. The menu, which was printed in Arabic and French, included such desert delicacies as roast gazelle, "couscous" and camel's milk. Dances executed by celebrated native beauties followed the banquet. 
