### FIGHTING STAMP TAX.

#### Havana Druggists Still Keep Closed Doors.

HAVANA, April 29.-The matter of the drug stores of Havana that closed Sunday in protest against the imposition of a stamp tax of 2 cents on every package of patent medicine sold remains unchanged. The druggists wish to appeal to President Palma, but the president cannot intervene even if he considers it advisable to do so until fifteen days after the request for the suspension of the tax was presented to the provincial governor. General Nunez, civil governor of Havana, says the time to veto the tax is passed and that he could not do this even if he wanted to.

A considerable section of the public press advocates amending the constitution so as to abolish all provincial governments as an unnecessary expense. This question will be an important issue in the next elections.

### Gough Reffres Fighting.

LONDON, April 27.-A long official dispatch has been received here from Bohotle, Somallland, to the effect that Major Gough's flying column, numbering about 200 men, attacked a large force of the enemy near Danop. The column formed in a square and resisted with success for several hours, receiving re-enforcements from Danop. Ammunition becoming scarce, the British forces retired slowly on Danop, bringing all their wounded with them. They were continually attacked en route. In addition to thirteen men killed, including two officers, there were twenty-eight men and four officers wounded.

## FRANCHISE TAX LAW

The Act Upheld by Court of Appeals.

APPELLATE DECISION IS REVERSED.

Judge Vann Writge Opinion, Which Was Unanimous-Home Rule Is Not Violated-New York Corporations Must Pay.

ALBANY, N. Y., April 29.-The special franchise tax law has been declared constitutional by the court of appeals by a unanimous vote. Judge Vann wrote the opinion. The court reverses the decision of the appellate di-

This decision is on the appeal of Attorney General Cunneen from the decision of the appellate division of the supreme court of the third department, handed down on Jan. 20 last, declaring the special franchise tax law to be invalid.

The court of appeals sustains the constitutionality of the law as a whole. The appellate division decided that the law was unconstitutional in that it gave the state tax commission instead of the local assessors authority to assess the local franchises.

The court of appeals holds in brief that the legislature in creating a new system of taxation, embracing a new kind of property never taxed before, had the right to intrust the power of making the assessment to state officers and that tangible property, such as rails and poles, which had been formerly taxed by local assessors, was merely incidental to the special franchises and hence that there was no infringement upon local self govern-

In his opinion Judge Vann reviews the enactment of the special franchise tax law and the litigation which has followed in the efforts of the corporations to declare this law unconstitutional or unworkable. He also reviews the various constitutions of the state regarding the home rule principle.

This decision means that the corporations will have to pay this tax for four years back, and it has been estimated that it would raise anywhere from \$3,-000,000 to \$4,500,000 annually, so that in back taxes anywhere from \$12,000,-000 to \$18,000,000 is due from the corporations. None of the revenue from the franchise tax go to the state treasury, but all go to the localities in which they are raised.

The cases before the court involved the constitutionality of the so called Ford law of 1899, which imposed a tax on special franchises or the right granted by the state to lay railroad tracks or to erect telegraph and telephone lines in the public highways. The power to make the assessment was conferred upon the state board of tax commissioners instead of upon local assessors, and this was alleged to violate the principle of home rule as intrenched in the constitution. This contention was overruled by Judge Earl. who, acting as referee, decided the cases in the first instance. The appellate division, however, reversed and held by a divided court that the act infringed the home rule provision of the constitution.

European Squadron's Movements. VILLEFRANCHE, France, April 29. -Rear Admiral Cotton, commander in thief of the United States European squadron, arrived here at 3 o'clock in the afternoon. Officers from the Chitago met him at the railroad station and escorted him on board the ship. The admiral hoisted his flag on the Chicago, and salutes were fired by the flagship and the other vessels of the squadron. The squadron, with the exteption of the auxiliary cruiser Buffalo, which remains here, sailed at 6 o'clock

in the evening for Marseilles. Providence Man a Suicide.

BOSTON, April 29.-Captain Hopkins of the steamer Admiral Farragut reports that when the steamer was off Highland light, on her way to this city from Port Antonio, Jamaica, one of the passengers, listed as C. Seabury of Providence, R. I., dashed out of his stateroom and, uttering a yell, plunged everboard. Efforts were made to resrue the man, but they were of no avail. His actions were peculiar throughout the passage.

LONDON, April 29.—An appeal has been issued by the United Irish league to Irishmen throughout the world asking them to start immediate subscriptions for the parliamentary fund of 1903. A report has reached Washington to the effect that Dr. W. Godfrey Hunter, ex-Minister to Guatemala and a prominent republican leader of Kentucky, has become an active Fairworking to secure a solid delegation pledged to the Indiana Senator in the next convention. Some prominent Kentucky republicans say that Dr. Hunter will not be able to "deliver the goods" but the mere fact that he has been authorized to make the attempt is most significant. North Carolina republicans would, it is stated on excellent authority, gladly vote for Mr. Fairbanks in preference to Mr. Roosevelt and practically all of the southern states vall follow the lead of Senator Hanna who is the idol of the republican party in the South. Meanwhile the split between Senator Platt and Governor Odell in New York is an occasion of serious anxiety and it is held, not without reason, that the President will be unable to carry his own state. In fact, Mr. Lou Payn, a long acknowledged republican oracle in New York state. says the democrats will carry the state by 100,000 votes.
