Want Game Laws Changed.

A number of sportsmen, says the Hazleton Sentinel, have drawn up the following petition, which after circulation through the different counties, will be forwarded to the next Legislature.

That there shall be no gun used to kill or assist in killing deer that propels more than one metal bullet or pellet at any one shot from a gun or any one discharge of powder.

That the season for killing deer, hare, rabbit, pheasant, grouse, woodcock and quail shall open at same date of same month of each year.

That no person or persons shall kill or assist in killing more than one deer in any one lawful season.

That no person shall kill or have in his possession more than twenty pheasants, grouse, woodcock, quail each, in one lawful season.

That there be a liberal bounty paid for each and every weasel, hawk and owl killed in Pennsylvania, to be paid by the township in which said weasel, hawk and owl are killed.
