First and Second Stories of Woolen Mill Gutted This Morning-

The sounding of the fire alarm, the clanging of the bells on the hose trucks as they were being hurried off in the direction of box 21, from ium of noises which aroused the res-idents of town shortly after six o'clock this morning. The cause as the "Lamb of God." of the commotion was a fire at E. C. Caswell & Co's woolen mill. The blaze started on the first floor near the office, in the north east corner of the building and burned over a large portion of the floor and made its way up through to the second floor. All the fire companies were on the scene promptly and it required the strength of the department to subdue the frames.

Nearly all of the machinery on the first floor as well as much of it on the second floor was considerably damaged. The flames did not reach the third floor, but the machinery there consisting of dryers and some other equipment was more or less impaired by the intense heat.
