Deer in Large Herds Among Farmers.

For the first time in perhaps half a century, deer are so numerous in the South Mountains of Adams, Franklin and Cumberland counties that they have become an absolute pest to farmers on the slope of that range of the Blue Mountains.

For two weeks they have appeared in herds after night-fall on farms along the border. So bold has one herd of at least thirty become that on Saturday night twenty-five acres of wheat on the estate of Jacob Edwards, near the Narrows, north of Arendtsville, Adams county, was destroyed.

This wheat field is within a stone's throw of the buildings on the Edwards farm.

At the farm of Alburus Coles, near Trust Postoffice, Adams county, fourteen deer leisurely strolled down the Shippensburg road in broad daylight on Sunday.

Other farmers in clearings higher up in the mountains have been obliged to rig up scarecrows, and at regular intervals fire guns to keep deer away from their premises.

One man keeps his dogs leashed in his fields at night in order that their barking might frighten deer away.

Week Old Tea.

The tea drinkers of Australia rival those of China and Japan, not, however, in quality, but in quantity, consumed.
