

SEVEREST STORM OF THE YEAR.

Sunday afternoon's storm was one of the most severe of the summer. Possibly not in the precipitation of rain, though it came down very hard for a time, but in respect to the electrical concomitants, it easily eclipsed anything that has visited this section this summer. The lightning was frightful in its sharpness and intensity, and many people, who were wont to sit out on the porch and enjoy the accompanying cooling breezes, sought the security of their homes.

No damage has been reported here, but in Orange township, a tree near the residence of Arthur Line was made the target of a very bolt, and one of its branches, after having been torn off, crashed through one of the windows of the dwelling, striking Mr. Kline's daughter, Bessie on the arm. It was at first feared that her arm had been broken, but an examination by Dr. Vance, revealed only a mere bruise.

The Bloomsburg & Sullivan Railroad Company suffered from the effects of the storm, as did also the S. B. & B. Co. There was a landslide on the B. & S. between Orangeville and Light Street, between extensive proportions, while on the S. B. & B. the track was badly washed out at two different places.

Reports from other points in the county would seem to indicate that the storm covered a wide path. On first street, Nescopeck, the large double house owned by John G. Meyers and tenanted by D. P. Myers and the Paynton family was struck by a cold flash of lightning during the storm and virtually split in two. Both families were in the house at the time and while they were greatly shocked and frightened by the rash there was no one seriously injured. The flash struck at the able end, split down through the roof, through the garret floor and down to the second and first floors throwing every thing topsy turvy. Had it been a hot flash the house with all contents would have been immediately devoured by flames.

New Hoboken Terminal

Lackawanna Railroad Pushing Work On Immense New Passenger Depot

The Lackawanna Railroad is planning to replace its passenger terminal in Hoboken, which was destroyed by fire on August 7th, and the officials state no efforts now will be spared to do this with the least possible delay.

Until the new building is ready temporary waiting-rooms, dining-rooms and other necessary facilities will be provided. Plans for the new terminal call for a vast ferry and railroad structure with sixteen tracks and six ferry slips. The buildings will be absolutely fire-proof. Their construction will be of steel and concrete throughout. The main waiting-room will be 150 feet square and 54 feet high with enormous windows on all sides. The restaurant will be on the main floor, overlooking the water with view up and down the river, and wide balcony projecting from the restaurant for dining out of doors in summer.

Passengers from boats to trains will not be compelled to pass through the main waiting-room but may use the forty-foot concourse leading to the tracks. The exterior of the building will be 600 feet long on the river side with a central tower 225 feet high. This tower will be electrically illuminated at night and its lighted clock faces will be one of the noticeable sights of the harbor.

The performance closed with an after-piece, a burlesque on the tent show. It was a big spectacular act unique through out.
