# THE RAILWAY IN CHINA

Some of the Difficulties to be MONDAY, JANUARY 15, 1906, Overcome in Construction

#### GRAFT FLOURISHES, TOO

Syndicates Bought Up Land Along Proposed Route and Held It Against the Railroad Company-Trouble Over Removal of Graves -Corner on Building Material.

The final contract for the Shanghal-Nanking line was signed after protracted negotiations by Sheng Taden and the concessionaires (the British and Chinese corporation) in July, 1903. Between that date and the actual beginning of earthworks further pourparlers were necessitated on points of detail, financial and administrative, in regard to which Sheng Ta-jen's attitude was persistently obstructive. Eventually, at the instance of the British government, an intimation was conveyed to the Director-General from the Wal-wupu that further obstruction would entail unpleasant results, and since then matters have advanced more satisfactorily.

The line to Nanking via the provincial capital (Soochow) is approximately 200 miles long, running through flat country intersected by many creeks and covered as far as Chinking with innumerable graves; thence to Nanking on the slope of the hills which ite parallel and close to the Yangtse. By the terms of the contract Sheng Ta-jen receives \$250,000, in return for which he is bound to acquire all necessary land and to obtain the removal of graves within the limits required by the railway. Eighteen months after the arrival of the engineering staff, only thirty-eight miles of the total length had been acquired, and this in isolated sections. The construction now proceeds as

the land is handed over; it is therefore evident that future progress will depend chiefly on Sheng's performance of his duties. He promised to give the company full possession of all the land as far as Soochow before April, 1905, and thence to Wusich before June; but continuous pressure has not succeeded in securing the fulfilment of this official's promises. In the meanwhile it is interesting to observe that, so soon as the survey of any section is completed and the line definitely located, a Chinese syndicate of which Sheng Ta-jen's son is the reputed head-purchases the land. wherever possible, from the agricultural owners and holds it against the railway company, claiming a large advance on the market value. (The price paid for agricultural land, compulsorily acquired, varies between £20 and £40 per acre.) Those operations primarily concern the Chinese government; but, as they delay construction work and thus increase the ultimate cost of the rallway, they concern also the concessionaires to whom Sheng frequently appeals for funds to meet "unexpected contingencles."

Another source of difficulty lies in the removal of graves. This is a question which presents itself everywhere in China; but in the country, between Shanghai and Wasieh it is unusually prominent, because, the Hne runs through what might be described as a continuous graveyard. Tombs and family burying grounds, frequently of great also, are scattered haphazard throughout the highly cultivated fields. Many have been removed during the past year, but even on the land niready handed over an enormous number remain, and for these gaps have to be left in the embankments.

For each grave's removal compensation has to be paid at rates varying between 10s, and £1 and as this business is also transacted by Sheng's staff, it presents a continual cause of friction and delay. Socalled benevolent societies have been formed at various centers and collect subscriptions with the ostensibly plous object of removing the remains of the numerous departed Chinese who left no descendants to practice for them the rites of filial plety, The Tai-ping rebellion left many such cases in its track.

These societies employ coolies to collect the bones, which are then reverently placed in a Devoe's kerosene packing case or other equally inexpensive receptacle and thereafter deposited on the nearest piece of waste land, the society's work being confined to claiming and getting the compensation per set of bones collected. The smallest remains will suffice to justify a claim, and unidentified ancestors are therefore in demand all along the line. It te reported, though difficult to prove, that the Chinese members of the board of commisioners and other local mandarins have been prominently connected with the "benevolent" societies.

Another interesting example of Chinese official methods came to fight when the construction of bridges was begun. The corporation soon discovered that a completely organized corner had been formed by the Chinese to control the supply of skilled labor and of bricks. So effective was this combine that concould be done at anything like reasonable prices, and one of the consulting engineers (A. J. Barry) has therefore made arrangements for the establishment of independent brick-yards and the importation of labor from Tientsin. PAPER MILK BOTTLES.

A Sanitary Reform Which Promises Much.

Consumers of milk who have come to appreciate the value of purity and freedom from infection will be interested in an idea that originated in Philadelphia, says the New York Tribune. Every one who has studled the matter carefully knows that there are several ways in which milk mny become contaminated. If the dairy farm is an ideal one, if the fluid is promptly cooled, if its temperature remains low during the period of transportation, if the city deal r late whose hands R passes on arrival is both honest and intelligent, there still remains a source of possible mischief. Some of the milk which is buttled before distribution may be injured by a tack of thoroughness in cleaning the glass receptacles after previous use. It is against that particular piece of earelessness that it is now proposed to goard by discarding the present style of bottle altogether and replacing it with another, which, like the cheap wooden plates sometimes provided for picnics, shall be used only once. The new bottle is to be made of heavy paper or pasteboard, manufactured out of spruce pulp. Dr. A. H. Stewart, bacteriologist of the Board of Health in Philadelphia, conducted a series of tests with it, and reports approvingly upon its quali-

The bottles are stamped out of heavy three-ply paper, and a contral shape is given to them to facilitate packing for shipment in nests. The bottoms have a double thickness, and their edges are locked in such a way that pressure from above adds to their strength. It is said that a weight of two hundred pounds may be put on a bottle without crushing it. The cover is stout, and has protruding lips for convenience in removal. Glue is used in fastening the overlapping edges of the body, but a coating of paraffine prevents it from affecting the taste of the milk and renders the bottle waterproof. Sterlization by exposure to a temperature of 212 degrees Fahrenheit is the final operation to which the receptacle is subjected. It is intended to have half pint, pint and quart sizes.

Advocates of the new scheme insist that it possesses many minor advantages. A paper bottle weighs two ounces, whereas the glass one holding a quart weighs twenty-four or more.

The carrying capacity of a delivery wagon would be greatly increasedalmost doubled, they say-because the driver would have no old bottles to collect. The dealer would be subjected to no loss through breakage or the stealing of empty bottles. The wholesale cost of glass bottles is about three cents for pints and five cents for quarts. It is estimated that the paper bottles will cost not more than \$8 or \$10 a thousand, or not to exced a cent apiece. In view of the compensations which are expected to attend their use, Dr. Stewart thinks that milk dealers would not be warranted in raising their prices in consequence of substituting the new bottle for the old. However, one important effect which he anticipates from the Innovation, is that the operation of bottling will be transferred from the headquarters of the city dealer to the dairy farm. Heretofore the danger of breaking during shipment has been a formidable obstacle to such a change, which is extremely desirable from sanitary considerations, and possibly that obstacle may

now be removed. The operation of washing returned mill: bottles is today conducted with various degrees of thoroughness. In Instances, no doubt, it is well done. Nevertheless, many shocking stories, which probably have good foundation, are told about the carelessness of lazy drivers of city milk wagons. It is said that they often refill dirty bottles without cleaning them at all. Even when the bottles are brought back to the milk shop to be refilled, the task of preparing them for fresh service is of m performed so negligently " it they might as well have been it alone entirely. Obviously, if a bottle is discarded forever after do duty once, there cannot be any make to health from this source.
