On and after January 1st, 1907, the Bloomsburg Water Company will agree to a new five years contract with the Bloomsburg Town Council, in which charges on the seventy-two fire plugs, now in use by the Town, shall be at the rate of fifteen dollars each per year;

That all plugs added during that term be charged a rate of ten dollars each per year;

That the water used in the Town Hall shall be furnished free of

That all other arrangements, privileges and restrictions as set forth in present contract shall be embodied in new contract. Respectfully yours,
