WOMEN MAKE PAPER MONEY.

Even Guides at Bureau of Engraving and Printing Are Girls.

The Government and the banks, and even the post office, would be in a hole for a time if all the women in the Bureau of Engraving and Printing should drop dead all at once. Why, you can't even go over there and look around without a woman to show you. All the guides to the Bureau for the benefit of tourists and other ignorant people are women. These guides will explain how American money is printed on the back, then put in cold storage, where it goes through a drying process; then sorted and the imperfect sheets thrown out; then printed on the face, and then perforated and put up in packages to be sent to the Treasury for the Government seal.

"It is seven days after a bill is printed on its back before it is printed on the face," said this visitor's guide. "It takes thirty days to make a silver dollar bill, and forty to make a gold one. The gold one is printed three times, twice on one side, because it has to have the word 'gold' and a little splotch of gold on this side before the face can be printed."-From the Washington Post.

Keeping the House Cool.

Of all the rooms in the house it is particularly important to keep the bed-

rooms cool. Windows should be closed and blinds shut at midday, to keep out the hot, stiffing air, and then thrown wide open in the evening, when the air is generally cooler.

This method carried out in the cellar is equally satisfactory, and each cellar window when open at night should have coarse wire grating fitted into it.

Kitchen windows should never be closed, if there is a fire burning in the stove.

In summer the wise housekeeper arranges her cooking so that there is no excessive heat except in the morn-

Dispense with the range, and use only an oll or gas stove, except on ironing days, or when an extra large amount of hot water is wanted. In small families the gas or oil stove can be used altogether.

When the family is large, on ironing days it is wise to take advantage of the strong fire to cook meat enough to last for three days, and also to bake bread and pies.
