The Rules Committee, appointed by the Democratic County Convention, met at the Court House in Bloomsburg, on Saturday last, and formulated a set of Rules for the government of the Democratic party in Columbia county. The Committee will again meet on August 10th, next, for the purpose of formally adopting these Rules.

The Rules follow:

RULE I-PRIMARY ELECTIONS

Two primary elections shall be held each year, in each election district of Columbia County. Each committeeman must reside in the election district he is chosen to represent. In case of a tie vote for standing committeeman, the candidates receiving the tie vote shall cast lots before the county commissioners of Columbia County and the one to whom the lot shall fall shall be declared the standing committeeman of such election district provided that the County Chairman shall cast the lot on behalf of any candidate who shall refuse to appear for such purpose before the County Commissioners, and in case both candidates refuse to appear, the County Chairman and Secretary shall respectively cas. the lots on behalf of said candidates.

Section 2. In case of a vacancy occurring in the office of standing committeeman of any district by reason of death, resignation or otherwise, the Courty Chairman shall have the power to appoint a successor to fill said vacancy, provided each member of the standing committee shall have power to appoint a substitute for any special parpose, which substitution must be in writing, properly signed and forwarded to the County Chairman, and when new election districts are created the County Chairman shall name the committeeman of such district, who shall serve until a successor is duly elected according to law. Any substitute appointed under this section must reside in the election district he is substitut-

State Health to be Guarded Vigilantly

The advisory board of the State Department of Health, at a meeting at Harrisburg, adopted a rule under which the physicians in the Democratic party, the Chairman of rural districts throughout Pennsylvania shall report every case of communicable disease immediately to the department's township health a successor, who shall serve until cfficer, who will see that sanitary rules of the department to prevent the spread of the infection are carried out. The report of rural cases have hitherto been made to the county medical inspectors of the department.

The board also adopted the fol-lowing resolution with reference to the vaccination of school children:


"That in the opinion of the ad-visory board and the commissioner of health, a person who has had the operation for vaccination faithfully performed three times at intervals of two successive weeks, without success, is for the time being immune from smallpox, and further, that under the present law persons who have a written certificate from a registered physician that two such attempts to vaccinate were faithfully performed and a second certificate from a physician of the standing committee to fill of the State Department of Health or of a board of bureau of health or sanitary committee of a city or borough, may be admitted to school for one year without violat-ing the spirit of the law, the object of which is simply to prevent the spread of smallpox."
