Skill in Games Worth More Than Money to Climbers.

CARD PLAYER POPULAR

Tennis and Polo Better Than Story Telling and Singing-Deference to Older People Pays-Skill in Athletics a Social Open Sesame for Women as Well as for Men.

It has frequently been said by persons who should know that the ability to play games well is an easier means of getting into society than the possession of money. It is not difficult to point to many cases in which men merely through expertness in sports have won a place for themselves in the highest society.

This has been especially true of tennis," says a clubman in the New York Sun. "The process of becoming socially popular through this sport is not difficult to explain.

The men who play well take part in fournaments at Newpork and other summer resorts. The victor or even the very good player must be very much of a bounder not to be welcamed at the first houses in these places. In this way they make friends that remove from their paths many difficulties in the social ascent. These men are always welcomed as members of good clubs because men who play games well are in demand everywhere.

"Good polo playing is a mighty aid to the socially ambitious. Men who are adepts in this game must have other very objectionable qualities notto be received cordially everywhere.

"One great advantage of the man who succeeds socially through his skill in sports is that he arrives through the men rather than the women. Men of the set which so many are striving nowadays to enter have much more respect for the newcomers that are introduced by men than for those introduced by women."

This was the opinion of a man who has seen many young men climb to the social heights on which they had set their eyes and who himself many years ago accomplished the same fourney. He is a mine of social wisdom, produced first by his own struggles and then by observing the efforts of others.

It must be said in his favor that he has always offered a helping hand to his juniors setting out on the same way he traveled so long ago. He is an exception to the rule that social strugglers kick out the rungs of the ladder as they mount.

"It is not only by means of athletics that the young man may make himself popular with his own sex, this social sage observed. "He may follow the serious and business policy.

They say that oldish women are always complimented by deference and attention from young men. Well, I am surely not mistaken when I say that oldish men are just as suscept: ble to these attentions. They like to have young men listen to their opinions, question them as to their experiences and above all to talk to them about business matters.

"The necessary preliminary to this sort of social success for a climber is membership in a good club. He cannot find the old men to talk to until he gets in. Then if he is attentive to the old members in the way I have described he will soon find that he is one of the most substantially popular men in the place.

"Younger men will soon look up to him once they realize that his seniors like him. I knew a young man to be elected governor of one of the most important clubs socially in this city merely because he had cultivated the older men from the time he joined the club.

"That popularity is moreover of a very substantial kind. It means much more than invitations which are obtained by assiduous leaving of cards, endless drinking of tea and much talking down the back of women's necks in opera boxes."

The new avenues to social importance opened by skill at bridge have introduced a number of persons who would never have been thought of five years ago and there are men as well s women among these newcomers. The game is generally more difficult among women than men. Men are much more in demand always.

Athletics have proven nearly as much of an open sesame to women as to men. A girl who can ride well or plays good tennis will find herself almost as acceptable to any society as

one who plays good bridge. Singing or musical talent in any form will not be of much use to her. Games, games and still more games will make her an appreciative visitor at country houses or guest at dinners.

Both men and women often combine the ability to play very good bridge and athletic skill. Those fortunate persons who unite for instance bridge and tennis have a great advantage over their rivals.

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
