

LANDSLIDE BURIES 1,500

Village of Karatagh, Turkestan, Destroyed in Earthquake.

MAJORITY KILLED

First Reports of the Casualties Were Exaggerated, Placing the List of Dead at 15,000.—Governor and His Mother Among the Survivors.—Town a Summer Resort.

Tashkend, Russian Turkestan, Nov. 7.—The little town of Karatagh, in the Hissar district of Bokhara, has been overwhelmed and completely destroyed by a landslide that followed the earthquake of Oct. 21. According to the latest reports of the disaster a majority of the inhabitants of Karatagh lost their lives.

The first reports of the casualties were exaggerated, the death list being placed as high as 15,000. Karatagh has about 2,500 dwellers, and there is reason to believe that about 1,500 were buried alive.

Among those who survived the disaster are the Governor of Karatagh and his mother.

Karatagh is remotely situated, and it takes a full week for news to get out from there, but according to one courier who has come through an enormous section of the Karatagh Mountain, which practically hung over the town, broke loose and thundered down upon the village, which is almost completely buried.

Efforts are being made to get in communication with the survivors and to send in such relief as may be required.

Karatagh is noted for its manufactures of sabres, cutlery, and fine silks, and is used as a summer resort by the people of Hissar. It is 2,500 feet above the sea.

SHOOTS HER SISTER.

Woman Playfully Points Revolver—Usual Result.

Richmond, Va., Nov. 7.—Mrs. R. L. Patterson, twenty-eight years old, was shot and probably fatally injured by her sister, Mrs. P. J. McDonnell, who had pointed an old and supposedly unloaded revolver at her sister at the supper table, demanding a second helping of salad. The two women were seated a few feet from each other—so close, in fact, that a lamp on the table went out with the report of the revolver.

Mrs. Patterson was hurried to the Virginia Hospital, where an operation was performed in an effort to relieve her brain of the particles of the bullet, which had been shattered. Another operation will probably be performed. It is said that there is practically no chance of the woman recovering. The shooting was witnessed by Mrs. Patterson's two small children and by a second sister.

BURN 250,000 POSTAL CARDS.

Philadelphia Authorities Act Under Supervision of Comstock.

Philadelphia, Penn., Nov. 7.—Nearly a quarter of a million picture postal cards confiscated by postal authorities recently were burned in the basement of the Federal Building in this city. The cards were destroyed under the supervision of Anthony Comstock, Secretary of the Anti-Vice Society of New York.

The value of the cards at retail, it is said, was about \$3,000.

Aged Horsewoman's Bet.

Marysville, Ohio, Nov. 5.—Miss Annetta Wilbur, eighty-nine years old, will ride on horseback one hundred miles to Hamilton, Ohio, on a wager. Despite her advanced age, Miss Wilbur is an enthusiastic horsewoman, and is a member of the newly organized Bit and Spur Club.

Some of the woman's friends, also members of the club, in commenting upon her ability as a horsewoman declared their belief she could not stand a journey of one hundred miles. She immediately took them up and wagered a dinner for the club that she could make the trip with ease. She will start in two weeks.

Woman in Auto Killed.

Concord, Mass., Nov. 5.—Mrs. Nellie W. Conant, wife of Herbert E. Conant of Newton, was killed in an automobile accident here.

Accompanied by her husband and by Mr. and Mrs. Barnes of Newton, she was riding along Walden Street in a steam runabout. When in trying to pass another machine the steering gear became jammed and the runabout crashed into a telegraph pole at the side of the road. Mrs. Conant was thrown against the pole and her skull was crushed. The others of the party escaped with bruises.

Rich Woman a Burglar.

Chicago, Nov. 7.—Mrs. Evelyn Romandka, wife of the wealthy trunk manufacturer, pleaded guilty before Judge Brentone to five indictments, three charging burglary and the others larceny. Sentence will be pronounced in a day or two.

There is no escape for the woman now from the penitentiary. It is believed that she will be sentenced on one indictment, the others remaining over her. The penalty for burglary is from one to fourteen years.

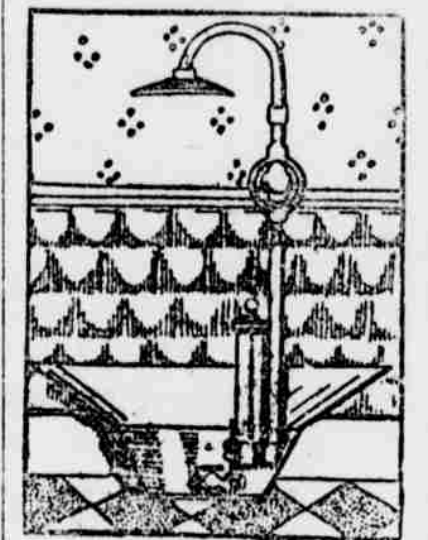

PORTABLE SHOWER BATH.

Apparatus for Providing Continual Shower With Little Water.

It is now possible for the individual to get a morning shower bath, no matter where he or she is located, as a Michigan man has invented a portable shower bath that overcomes all difficulties usually met with.

As shown in the illustration, the portable shower bath consists of a

shallow circular basin, wide enough for a person to stand in. Projecting from the edges is a deep inclined flange. A partition divides the tub into two compartments. Mounted in one of the compartments is a pump, from which projects upright pipes and nozzle. The inventor works on the assumption that but a few gallons of water are available. Such being the case, it is placed in the tub. It is then pumped by a person standing in the tub to the nozzle, descending in the usual spray. The duration of the bath is not limited on account of the meagre supply of water, as it is possible to use the same water over and over again, as it eventually finds its way back into the basin again. The entire apparatus can be quickly taken apart and packed in a trunk.

A New Kind of Bread.

An entirely new kind of bread, made either of wheat or rye, is becoming popular in Germany, and is likely soon to be introduced into this country. It is made of the whole grain—but not according to any method hitherto familiar.

The grain is germinated by alternate steeping in warm water and aeration, this being accomplished by a simple mechanical apparatus. As soon as rootlets appear it is ready for use, and is crushed to fineness between rollers, after which it is dropped through a chute into an iron trough on the floor below, where it is kneaded by a machine. The preliminary process is one of malting—similar to the malting of barley. All the water used in the sprouting process, which contains a large part of the mineral salts of the grain, is poured into the iron trough to make the dough. Thus nothing is lost, the entire substance of the grain being included in the dough, which, with the addition of yeast and salt, is finally formed into loaves and baked in the ordinary fashion.

The bread thus made is said to have a delicious flavor. It is claimed for it that the process of germination makes the substance of the grain much more digestible.
