DOLLAR AND THE PESO.

What a Dollar Means in Mexico Has Been Settled. The question in Mexico of what a "dollar" means has recently been authoritatively settled. The Department of Finance has decided that the word "dollar" shall mean the American gold dollar and that when the Mexican silver dollar is meant the word "peso" shall be employed.

Princess Fedora a Novelist. Princess Fedora of Schleswig-Holstein, the youngest sister of the German Empress, is the author of a novel recently published in Germany entitled, "Hahn Bertal." She has a romantic history, having declined all offers of marriage since the tragic death of her fiance, Duke Frederick of Mecklenburg-Schwerin, who, while in command of a torpedo boat, perished in the Baltic with the entire crew.

New Opera by Verdi. A complete score of a new opera by Verdi, the existence of which has hitherto been unknown, has been discovered in Paris in an old chest full of manuscripts and other papers which formerly belonged to the famous musician. It was the composition of this opera which occupied some of the latter months of Verdi's life.

The Expectation of Life. Notwithstanding improved medical knowledge and the benefits of modern sanitation, we are dying earlier than our grandparents did. The United States census shows a considerably increased death rate for all ages over sixty years. At the same time, it still holds good that the average expectation of life has been lengthened during the past decades but it is only the younger individuals who profit by this practical result of the advances in medical knowledge.

Bill Moves Slow. There is pending in the French Parliament a bill providing for old-age pensions to railroad work people. This bill was introduced 10 years ago, and five years ago was submitted to the President of the Senate. In order to hurry him up a little on June 8 last 499,000 postcards were addressed to him by as many railroad men in all parts of France asking his early attention to the matter.

To Improve Japan's Railways. The Japanese Government has decided to carry out, in connection with the nationalized railroads, a thorough improvement on a large scale of all State lines. The work, of which the estimated cost is about \$1,800,000, is to be completed in five years, in time for the opening of the exhibition in 1912.—Engineer.

Women Sharpshooters. Women who have recently joined the Wandsworth (England) Rifle Club have proved so expert in the use of the rifle that scores of 35 out of a "highest possible" of 40 have frequently been recorded. The club committee is desirous of securing other women sharpshooters in order to arrange a match between the women and men.

Morgan Belongs to 50 Clubs. Pierpont Morgan belongs to four or five as many clubs as does the King His Royal Highness is a member of 12 while Mr. Morgan has his name on the lists of at least 50. Occasionally he visits some of them, while in the case of most of them he never has been inside their doors. Once a member of a club he never resigns.

Rocks of the Lizard. The dangerous rocks of the Lizard, on the coast of Cornwall, one of the oldest landmarks of the marine world are the scene of many terrible disasters. It was here that the Spanish Armada was wrecked when the Spaniards tried to invade England.

CORTELYOU TO RESIGN.

Washington Hears That He Will Head a N. Y. Financial Institution. Washington, Jan. 16.—There is a persistent rumor here that Secretary Cortelyou will soon resign from the Roosevelt Cabinet. The Secretary returned to Washington on Tuesday from New York.

It is to the effect that the Secretary will accept a position at the head of a New York financial institution. Reports that Mr. Cortelyou was not in sympathy with the President on the candidacy of Mr. Taft—in fact, that he had Presidential ambitions for himself—began to be heard early last summer.

20 SURGEONS AWAIT CALL.

Six Ambulances Also Held at Bellevue for an impending Catastrophe. New York, Jan. 14.—Expectation of a catastrophe held a crowd of several thousand persons tugging against the fire lines about the tottering walls of the Parker Building, gutted by fire on Friday at Fourth avenue and Nineteenth street, until a late hour Sunday night.

Police guards were increased several times during the afternoon and at eight o'clock at night Superintendent Edward S. Murphy, of the Department of Buildings, sent word to Bellevue Hospital to hold in readiness twenty surgeons and six ambulances, and to allow them to answer no other calls until further orders.

No Japanese Compact.

Washington, Jan. 13.—Official denial was made at the State Department on Friday of the report cabled from Tokio that Ambassador O'Brien had demanded from the Japanese Government an agreement in writing restricting to a certain annual number the emigration of Japanese to the United States.

It may be stated on absolute authority that the United States has not and will not make any such demand on Japan.

Stewart Heir Left \$1,348,000.

Garden City, L. I., Jan. 16.—The inventory of the estate of Cornelia Stewart Merleion, one of the heirs of the A. T. Stewart estate, was filed on Tuesday at Mineola. Mrs. Merleion died in France a number of years ago. The whole estate was left to the children in France. The estate is valued at \$1,348,238.

Sues for \$250,000.

Philadelphia, Jan. 15.—Richard A. Goebel, an Austrian who eloped with the daughter of D. Webster Dougherty of this city while the family was traveling abroad, has brought suit against Mr. Dougherty for \$250,000 for alienating his wife's affections.

Cleveland, Jan. 15.—Announcement was made on Monday by officials of the Lake Shore & Michigan that the time required for the run of the Twentieth Century Limited between New York and Chicago would be increased Sunday, Jan. 19.
