WASHINGTON

Washington, D. C., Jan. 14, 1908. Democrats and Republicans alike are up in arms over the treatment by the President of Rear Admiral Brownson concerning the resignation of the latter as Chief of the Bureau of Navigation. The President is roundly censured because of his failure to make public a letter written by Admiral Brownson in which he gives his reasons for the belief that the assignment of a naval surgeon to the command of a hospital ship is against the law and to the detriment of the service. Every application at the White House for this letter is met with the reply that the letter in question has no bearing upon the point at issue. Needless to say, the friends of the Admiral are of the opinion that this letter contains the crux of the situation and they consider that the President has handed out to Brownson anything but a "square deal" in this matter.

The "Bill to amend the national banking laws," prepared by Senator Aldrich, introduced in the Senate and referred to the Finance Committee of that body, is the important topic of discussion in political circles. As yet the Democrats have not committed themselves on this measure and the Republicans are very sanguine of little opposition from their Democratic brethren; in fact, the leaders in both houses think there is every likelihood that the bill will get through the Senate and the House in a reasonably short time.

Many bills were introduced in the House on the re-convening of Congress after the Christmas holidays, about one hundred and sixty in all, and of this large number one of the most important was a bill by Representative John Sharp Williams, repealing the law directing that three-fifths of the fifteen per cent. reserve of national banks may consist of balances due a bank available for the redemption of its circulating notes from banks approved by the Comptroller of the Currency. Mr. Williams' bill, also, repeals all laws permitting national banks to keep three-fifths of their reserves in national banks in reserve cities.

Mr. Williams, also, introduced a bill reducing the regular army, after the first day of December, 1908, to 35,000 men, 10,000 of whom shall constitute an artillery force for coast defense. The standing army, as now composed, embraces 40,000 odd officers and men. And a third bill was introduced by Mr. Williams repealing all laws by which national bank examiners are compensated by fees, and placing them on regular salary of \$3,000 per annum.

During the last few weeks there has been in Washington almost an epidemic of pedestrians, the latest victim of this ailment a Frenchman having called at the White House the first of this week to obtain from the President's secretary a card certifying that he called at the White House. He expects to circle the globe, ending in Paris, his starting point.

A bill has been introduced by Representative Gaines of Tennessee, to appropriate annually, for three years, \$3,000, and thereafter \$1,000 annually to be paid to the Ladies' Hermitage Association for the preservation and maintenance of the old home of Andrew Jackson, The Hermitage. President

Roosevelt favors this measure and made a recommendation similar in effect in his annual message to Congress. The Hermitage estate contains about five hundred acres and is situated seven miles outside of Nashville.

President Roosevelt has recommended, in a message to Congress, that the four thousand additional employes to be given the Census Bureau for the work of taking the thirteenth census be appointed from the Civil Service, as he declares, the examinations, noncompetitive, used for selecting the force for the last two censuses served only "as a cloak to hide the nakedness of the spoils system," and that such examinations are useless as checks upon patronage appointments.

Those friends of Governor Hughes of New York who are endeavoring to explain his silence on national questions claim that he is like Gov. Tilden and Grover Cleveland. Democrats in Washington, however, beg leave to differ with this analogy and point out that Tilden was by no means a stranger to national politics at the time he was proposed for the Presidency, as is Governor Hughes, but that on the contrary he was an eminent party leader, and had for years been a valued adviser of prominent Democrats in national office. His sponsors knew exactly where he stood and could speak definitely to those who did not know. And in the case of Mr. Cleveland they claim that he was vouched for by Daniel Manning, whereas Hughes has no one who can stand sponsor for him. He is a tyro in national politics and no one is more curious as to where he stands on national issues than the leaders of his own party. Therefore the Democrats are incensed that Hughes should be likened to these two prominent and well-known leaders of their party.

Against Storage Eggs.

Commissioner Foust Will Ask for Law Discouraging Their Sale.

Dairy and Food Commissioner Foust will recommend to the next legislature the enactment of a law to regulate the sale of eggs, the recent placing upon the market of thousands of stored eggs in order to take advantage of the ante-Christmas high prices having come to his notice.

"The ordinary person finds it difficult to procure fresh eggs unless he goes to the trouble of raising chickens," says Foust. "We are hearing every day about the tremendous increase of the cold storage business. Some people are of the opinion that cold storage eggs are no healthier than embalmed beef. The state should do something to discourage this particular industry.

Foust points to the action of the Minnesota authorities in examining into the egg supply of that state, which action, he states, has had the effect of making merchants more careful.
