Washington, April 9 .- Plans are being elaborated in detail for the mobilization of a joint military and * naval force in Venezuelan waters as soon as possible after President Roosevelt obtains Congressional

sanction to resort to force against Castro. It may not be deemed necasary by the administration to make this martial demonstration, but the War and Navy Departments are both mapping out a tentative military movement

The President cannot constitutionally declare war against Venezuela. Legislative authority would be required for a such a campaign, and the present preparation of plans is understood to be merely in accord with the policy of mapping out campaigns for possible emergencies. The directions given in the present instance are, however, the most explicit made since the army and navy were ordered to prepare for part clpetion in the international relief

SAYS JAPAN IS PREPARING.

Hobson Declares that We Should Be Ready for Any Emergency.

Washington, April 9 .--- Pointing out what he declared to be the precarious condition of the National defence of the United States both in the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans, Mr. Hobson of Alabama, in a speech on the Naval bill, made a plea for two battleships of 25,000 tons displacement, in addition to the two authorized by the Naval Appropriation bill.

The possibility of a conflict with Japan was discussed at length by Mr. Hobson, "It is true that America only asks a fair chance and no favor -simply the open door policy in China-but this policy goes contrary to Japanese ambitions."

Pursuing his analysis of the condittons in the Pacific, Mr. Hobson declared that "we cannot ignore the fact that Japan has undertaken stupendous war preparations which has doubled the national debt of Japan since the war with Russia ended. It is estimated that she has between 300,000 and 400,000 men under arms yet there is no menace from the armies of Siberia or the armies of China or the armies of Europe. No nation since the world began has ever maintained such an army under such conditions, except as a preparation for an early campaign of aggression.'.

Wheels Are Turning.

Buffalo, N. 1., April 8.-After four months of idleness, the rail mill of the Lackawanna steel plant and the furnaces that feed it have gone back to work. As a consequence two thousand steel workers and l.borers have been added to the working force increasing it from twenty-five hundred to forty-five hundred men. The full force is seven thousand men.

Pittsburg, Pa., April 8 .- About six hundred additions, men were put to work when the open hearth furnaces and the shaping and structural mills of the Homestead steel works resumed. Notices were posted announcing that several departments in the Howard Axle Works would resume work at once.

New London, Conn., April 8 .- The Niantic Manufacturing Company, of East Lynne, is running overtime to fill orders. The mill employs about 150 men.

Tokio, April 7 .--- Count Okuma received lately a delegation of Japanese residing in Sacramento, Cal., and Japanese newspaper men of San Francisco, who wished to get his views on the emigration problem. The Count is reported to have said:



In a special despatch from Shanghaj it is stated that Pekin is now greatly alarmed by the return of the anti-dynastic students from Japan, and precautions are being taken at all the legations.

Sullivan, was approved on its third reading and sent on its way to the Senate for the concurrence of that body.

New York, April 9 .- After a five months' search Daniel R. Delancy, who lived at 94 Hamilton Place, was arrested and brought to New York by Detectives Gegan and Wilbur on a charge of grand larceny. They caught him in Gee Cave at the summit of a mountain near Mountaindale, Sullivan County, N. Y. For three weeks Delaney had been living in the cave. He had two bloodhounds, three bird dogs, and four other dogs with him, besides guns and ammunition.

Evans's Gunners Shatter Records. San Diego, Cal., April 9 .- Every ship in the feet at Magdalena Bay has broken her gunnery record with points to spare, and the announcement may be expected that some of them individually and the fleet as a whole hung up world's records. This news has been brought here by Lieutenant Commander G, H. Bradshaw, and Lieutenant R. D. White, who were assigned from Washington to report on the target practice held at Magdalena Bay.

Ibitains Premier Gives Up Office. London, April 7 .- Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman has resigned the Premiership of Great Britain and his resignaton has been accepted. If is understaood that Herbert S. Asquith, the Chancellor of the Exchequer will succeed Sir Henry. The King has summoned him to Biarritz.

Owen Must Pay \$10,000 Fee.

Washington, April 9 .--- United States Senator Robert L. Owen of Oklahoma, must pay the local law firm of Dudley & Michner \$10,000 for services in connection with an allowance of the \$5,000,000 claim of the Cherokee Indians, granted by the last Congress, according to a decsion by Justice Robb of the District Court of Appeals. The decision says that Senator Owen received as an attorney's fee of \$750,000.

Senate Against Betting.

Albany, N. Y., April 8 .- After a bitter debate the Senate advanced to the order of third reading without opposition the Agnew-Hart bills embodying the Governor's recommendation for the suppression of race track gambling. This action was taken after a proposition to postpone the taking effect of the proposed laws until Sept. 1 had been voted down. Tho vote on this proposition, 26 to 23, may be a fair test of how the vote will stand on final passage.

Heflin Held for Trial.

Washington, D. C., April 9 .topresentative Heffin of Alasama, in police court after a plea of not guilty, gave bond of \$3,000 for appearance for trial on two charges of assault with a daugerous weapon. Bond was immediately furnished by O. G. Staples, proprietor of the hotel where the Alahama Congressman is stopping.

2,000 Steel Men Resume Work. Buffalo, April : .--- The Lackawanna Steel Company has put 2,000 men to work. Half of them are skilled steelmakers and the remainder laborers. The company have a total force of 4,500 men at work with prospects of continuing for several months.
