




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

To Resume Cattle Tests.

Albany N. Y., May 24 .- In spite of the protests from the farmers who have been injured by the system, and also in spite of the charges recently made by Governor Hughes regarding the administration of the State Agricultural Department, the old policy of applying the tuberculin tests to cattle will be continued with renewed vigor by R. A. Pearson, the new cattle commissioner, who succeeded Charles A. Wieting in April. Mr. Pearson said that as soon as the department
