State Paying School Funds.

Last week the State began payment of the largest annual school appropriation made by any commonwealth in the United States, and within the next six months no less than \$7,500,000 will be paid out of the state treasury for educa-

This is over \$2,000 ooc in excess of what is paid by New York, and far ahead of Massachusetts, Texas and other states where large educational appropriations are made. It is one half of \$15,000,000 school appropriation made by the last legislature and urged by Governor Stuart in his inaugural address, being carried to fruition by the efforts of State Treasurer John O. Sheatz, then chairman of the appropriation committee of the House.

Mr. Sheatz will make the payments as fast as the warrants are of several millions in the new capisent to him by Superintendent of tol job. Public Instruction N. C. Schaeffer. Dr. Schaeffer makes up the war-rants from reports made by local districts. These districts receive the money for reimbursement of what they paid during the year ending June 1, and must certify that they paid the minimum salaries of \$40 and \$50.

Address Every Package.

After the first of next July, shippers will be obliged to use caution in making freight shipments smaller than car load lots. On that date an order will go into force to the effect that the transporting companies will refuse to accept any shipment smaller than a car load if the package is not plainly marked with the name of the consignee and the name and address of the consignor. This rule is enforced to protect the railroad companies from damage claims arising from unmarked consignments going astray, as it was the practice of some shippers in sending out a large number of packages at one shipment, to mark one and simply initial the balance or leave them blank.
