The nine hundred thousandth patent from the United States patent office was issued Saturday, and to it was attached the name of Patent Commissioner Moore. The patent was an improvement on traveling stairs, such as are used in hotels and other large buildings, and while Mr. Moore ordinarily attaches his last name with his initials, he signalized the attainment of the nine hundred thousandth by Bruce Moore.

In the early history of the nation the law required that patents should be signed by the president and as the first one was issued during the first presidential administration, it was signed by President Washington. It covered a device for making pearl ashes, and the document itself is said to be now owned by a Chicago collector.

Mr. Moore estimates that the one milliouth patent will be reached in the year 1911. As going to show the inventive tendency of the American mind as compared with other countries, Mr. Moore calls attention to the fact that notwithstanding this is among the newest nations, and is one among many, the total of patents issued by the United States is not very far below the total for all other countries for all time. The issuance of foreign patents up to the date of the last report was 1,135,000 or only 235,ooo in excess of the total for this country.
