FINES FOR BIRDS ON HATS
Two Millinery Concerns Plead Guilty to Violating Law.
Columbia, S. C., Nov. 2.—Secretary Rice of the Audubon society, of South Carolina, obtained through a magistrate warrants against two Columbia dry goods and millinery concerns charging violations of the laws for the protection of non-game birds. The action taken by Mr. Rice is the second move of the kind that has been made against Columbia millinery concerns. The defendants pleaded guilty and were fined \$2 each.
Body Dragged From Murder Scene.
Wilkes-Barre, Pa., Nov. 2.—After hours of searching for the body of Harry Slovensky, who had been murdered and robbed, troopers of the state constabulary discovered it in a ravine near Hilldale, four miles from the city, and some distance from where it had first been seen. Who hid the body the constabulary have not discovered but they believe it was the man who murdered the young man and who destroyed to hide traces of their crime. Slovensky received his two weeks pay at the mines on Friday afternoon and started through the woods toward his home. That was the last time his fellow workers saw him alive.
Kansas Needs 6000 Men to Husk Corn.
Toneka, Kan., Nov. 2.—Kansas needs 6000 men to husk corn at once, according to the statistics gathered by the agents of the state employment bureau. The corn is ripe for handling. Every part of the state, except the extreme western section, where little corn is grown, has sent in a demand for men to work at 3 to 5 cents per bushel and board and lodging. An ordinary man can make \$2 to \$3 a day until Jan. 1.
Shot Dead in Political Quarrel.
Former Okla., Nov. 2.—During a political quarrel, Frank S. Seward, local Democratic committeeman, shot and killed John H. Milam, a farmer of Pawnee, Okla. The shooting occurred in Seward's hardware store. Milam was a Republican. The men became engaged in a heated political debate. Suddenly Seward drew a revolver and fired five shots into Milam's head. Milam had been prominent in Osage Indian affairs for years.
Russia to Send Ultimatum to Austria.
Paris, Nov. 2.—A Berlin dispatch to the Petit Parliant says it is rumored in diplomatic circles that Russia is about to send an ultimatum to Austria-Hungary and is making preparations for a hasty mobilization. The dispatch adds that it was impossible to obtain a verification of this report.
Wages of Textile Workers to Be Cut.
Fall River, Mass., Oct. 30.—James Tandy, president of the Fall River Textile council, has notified the union representatives that under the wage agreement between the manufacturer's association and the council there will be a further reduction in wages in the cotton mills next month. A further cut will be made on the woolen mills amounting to about 8 per cent, which will reduce the present weaving from 18.65 cents to 17.15 cents.

MASSACHUSETTS EXECUTIVE SEIZED WITH SEVERE ATTACK OF GASTRITIS.
Boston, Oct. 30.—Governor Curtis Guild, Jr., was seized with a severe attack of gastritis, according to a statement issued by the executive department at the state house.
As this is the third dangerous illness experienced by the governor within a year there is considerable anxiety over his condition.
Following is the statement issued: "Governor Guild's eagerness to resume full work and responsibility of his office has been too much for his strength and he is confined to the house by an attack of gastritis. It is not regarded as of a serious character, although it will keep him in the house for the remainder of the week."

PREACHER LEADS POSSE
Searching For Burglars Who Looted His Church.
New York, Oct. 30.—Rev. J. A. McCleary, pastor of the Episcopal church of the Good Shepherd at Fort Lee, N. J., assisted by a large number of his parishioners, is searching for a gang of burglars who looted the church and carried away property valued at several hundred dollars. The robbers not only took the gold and silver altar ornaments, but some costly vestments. The pastor found several clues in the church which he believes will lead to the apprehension of the robbers. This is the second time the church has been visited by burglars in two years. The first time they obtained property worth \$1000.
BETRAYED BLACK HAND BOTH ARMS CUT OFF
Italian Tells of Vengeance Wreaked Upon Him.
Newark, N. J., Oct. 30.—With both his arms cut off below the elbows by members of a Black Hand gang he was believed to have betrayed Villano Diptini appealed to the police here to protect him against any further vengeance.
Diptini told the police he joined the Black Hand in March, 1910, in a mining settlement, but later in the spring he was accused of having betrayed some of the members of his gang.
He was arrested, he said, at St. Michael's Pa., where he was extracted and dragged into a shanty near the railroad. There one of the men a doctor cut off both his arms.
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U. S. Mineral Output of \$2,069,289,196.
Washington, Oct. 30.—A grand total of \$2,069,289,196 worth of mineral products in the United States is announced in the statistical summary for the calendar year 1907, issued by the geological survey. Of this amount \$1,125,191 were non-metallic and \$944,095 metallic. The mineral products for the previous year aggregated \$1,904,697,034.
To Give Election Returns On Trains.
Chicago, Oct. 30.—A scheme to give election returns on trains Tuesday night has been devised by the managers of the Illinois Central and the Rock Island systems. These bulletins will be posted in and distributed through all passenger cars and steamers of every train over the railroads. The conductors will receive bulletins at every stopping place.
Fatally Shot His Father.
Charlotte, N. C., Nov. 2.—Fearing lest his father strike his mother whom he was pursuing with an axe, Ernest T. Hayes, twenty years old, shot and fatally wounded H. T. Hayes at Belmont, a suburb of this city. The trouble it is alleged grew out of a demand for money which he had paid his wife. When the demand was refused the man seized an axe and pursued his wife.
Mountain Disappears Into Sea.
San Francisco, Nov. 2.—According to officers of the revenue cutter Albatross, Mount McDiarmid, which for a year thrust its head to the sky west of Oronoko, has disappeared. The three of another volcanic eruption in its place, it is said, is a long and low bay three miles wide. Mount McDiarmid had a height of 200 feet.
Six Injured In Crash.
Huntington, Pa., Nov. 2.—Seven persons were injured when a Huntingdon & Broad Top passenger train crashed through an open switch and crashed into a string of cars on a siding near Saxton. The engine and the combination baggage and mail car were wrecked. The injured: G. B. Kay, engineer; G. W.
