\$4,500,000 for Pensions.

State Committee Will Have New Bill Introduced at Next Legislature.

Picking up the fight where it was left off when Governor Stuart vetoed the bill in 1907, the State Pension Committee, of the Department Encampment of Pennsylvania, G. A. R., has drafted a new soldiers' pension bill...

Copies of the proposed bill will be mailed to Governor Stuart and all members of the Legislature this week.

FEATURES OF PROPOSED BILL.

The proposed bill, in creating the position of Commissioner of Pensions, fixes the salary of the office at \$5,000 annually; makes the position one to be filled by appointment by the Governor...

One chief clerk, at \$1,800. Two clerks, at \$1,200 each. One stenographer, at \$1,000. One messenger, at \$900. Necessary additional clerks, at \$900 each.

Three clerks to the Pension Board, at \$1,200 each. The Pension Commissioner, and also the three members of the Pension Board shall serve for four years...

HOW PENSIONS WILL BE PROVIDED. Under the provisions of the proposed bill pensions are to be provided as follows:

That any person who enlisted in the army, navy or marine corps of the United States between April 12, 1861, and April 9, 1865, and served ninety days or more in the war for the suppression of the Rebellion...

any application twice refused by the said Pension Board shall not be again considered.

PAYMENTS TO BE MADE QUARTERLY

Payment of pensions, the bill provides, shall be made quarterly, beginning with the quarter ending February 28, 1910, and be payable quarterly thereafter on the first day of March, June, September and December of each year.

It is also provided that no applications for pensions shall be accepted or considered prior to September 1, 1909, and that no payment shall be made for a portion of a quarter...
