Wind-Gage for Trains. A singular device for the protec-

tion of railway-trains crossing a viaduct exposed to heavy winds has recently been employed at Ulverston England, says Prof. R. De C. Ward in Science. It consists of a wind-gage fixed at the west end of the Levens viaduct. When the wind-pressure pressure reaches 32 pounds to the square foot, an electric contact is made automatically, and bells ring to the signal cabins on each side of the viaduct. Upon this, all trains are de tained until the force of the wind The interruption is telegraphed along the line. In February 1907, a wind relocity of 65 miles an hour was recorded. 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
