many of our citizens into thinking that Pennsylvania sets apart a larger proportion of the State revenues for school purposes than any other State in the Union. This thought is far from true, if account is taken of the permanent revenues for educational purposes.

DECREASE IN MALE TEACHERS.

"This tendency should be viewed with alarm, because there is a time in the life of the average boy when he needs the influence of the masculine mind to inspire him with the sense of something to be achieved.

INDUSTRIAL TRAINING.

"In view of the decline of the apprentice system, the feeling is growing stronger that the schools should fit for bread winning, and hence should train the pupils for industrial life.

"The public school inspires social ambitions which predispose the girl to work, if she must work, in a factory or at a typewriter, in preference to entering domestic service.
