NOTED SQUIRREL DEAD

Trolleyman's Pet Crushed as He Tried to Board Car.

Caldwell, N. J.—Sandy, the gray squirrel which had its quarters near the loop where the trolley cars turn and head toward Newark, met an untimely fate here when he was crushed under the wheels of one of the cars and killed. Sandy was well known to all the motormen and conductors on the Bloomfield avenue line of the Public Service Corporation.

It was the squirrel's custom for the last two years to board the cars as they made the run around the loop here, forage in the aisles and seats for stray peanut and chestnut kernels, and then disembark as the end of the loop was reached and scamper back to his nest. The cars usually were empty as they went around the loop and Sandy never was molested.

The squirrel became so well known to the trolley men and lost so much of its timidity that it would seat out of their hands. On one occasion Sandy made the return trip to Newark perched on the controller of a car in charge of a kindhearted motorman who was a favorite of the animal. Sandy, however, did not take kindly to the experience and never again essayed the trip. Shortly before noon today the squirrel made a dash to board one of the cars as it entered the terminal. The animal missed the open door of the pay-as-you-enter car and landed under the wheels. Sandy was crushed to death before the car could be stopped.
