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RETAIL PRICES FOR FOOD.

A Startling Statement Made by the News Bureau.

The figures of Boston retail prices and wages published by the News Bureau, last Saturday, showed that the same quantity of food which cost \$3.02 in 1890 and \$3.91 in 1900, cost \$4.92 in 1910, an increase of substantially twenty-five per cent. over the earlier years. The Wall Street Journal estimates that in the last dozen years consumption in the United States of eight leading farm products increased thirty-three per cent. but aggregate farm production in quantity increased only three per cent. This condition is unquestionably of importance in explaining the advance of food in the United States, and might be accepted as the entire cause were it not that the phenomenon of advancing food prices is world-wide. It will be remembered that the Journal's figures showed that local wages had advanced in ten years at practically the same rate as food prices, and in twenty years at a rate of thirty-three per cent. greater. A reasonable inference from this discovery is that the reason for the advance of prices in commodities is the advance in the cost of labor. But labor after all is a commodity, and its price has risen in common with the price of most other commodities, and this, too, the world over. Prices are expressed in the terms of another commodity, gold, and many economists find in the extraordinary increase of gold production in recent years the only adequate explanation of the world-wide rise in commodity prices.

ROACHES IN THE HOUSE.

The roach nuisance has been brought to the attention of State Zoologist H. A. Surface, Harrisburg, by persons in different parts of the State. The cold winter, which resulted in brisk fires being maintained to keep up the temperature inside of dwellings, may have resulted in these pests becoming more numerous than usual.

A lawyer of Indiana, Pa., wrote to professor Surface, saying: "For some time past I have been troubled with roaches. They keep hid in cracks during the day, but at night come out in large numbers."

I think they must have been brought to the house with groceries. Everything is kept clean and in as good condition as is usually found about a well-regulated house and still they stay. We have tried various things in trying to get rid of them. I suppose that fumigating the entire house with formaldehyde would be effective. If you can give me any simple method of getting rid of them, I will be grateful for the advice."

Professor Surface replied as follows:

"These pests are quite persistent invaders, and generally cannot be exterminated by a single application. For this reason a combination of methods is desirable. Powdered borax blown around cracks they inhabit, especially around damp places in the kitchen floors, will help to drive them away. Powdered sugar, one part, and plaster of Paris, two parts, mixed together, will prove to be a good remedy. One of the best remedies is a proprietary substance sold on the market under the name of "Roach Paste" or "Roach Food." I should avoid the phosphorus poisons, as they are dangerous to use in the house. If the annoyance caused by roaches should reach the extreme limit and it be necessary for you to fumigate, you can do this safely with hydrocyanic acid gas, although you will have to vacate the rooms during the time of the fumigation. I should not attempt to fumigate them with formaldehyde, as I do not think this would be efficient in destroying roaches."

Gone Through the Rapids.

The following are some of the persons who have gone through the Rapids of Niagara River. Some of them were killed in doing it.

Robinson, McIntyre and Jones made the first known trip through the rapids in a small steamer in 1851.

Captain Matthew Webb, the famous English swimmer, paid his life as the penalty for his folly in attempting to swim the rapids in 1883.

Carlisle D. Graham, has gone through the Rapids five times in a barrel, and in 1901 swam the perilous course with the aid of life preservers.

William J. Kendall, swam the Rapids in 1886.

C. Alexander Percy, made two trips in a boat, the first in 1887.

George Hazlett and Sadie Allen made the trip in a barrel in 1886.

Robert W. Flack attempted the trip in a boat but drowned in 1889.

Walter G. Campbell had a thrilling experience which almost cost him his life in covering the course in a boat in 1889.

F. M. Bowser covered the course in a boat in 1900.

Peter Nissen made the third trip in a boat in 1902.

Miss Maude Willard, went through the Rapids in a barrel but was caught in the Whirlpool and whirled around for six hours. She died shortly after being rescued from the barrel. This happened in 1902.

Mrs. Anna Taylor is the only person who has ever gone over the Falls and lived to tell the tale. She accomplished this death-defying feat in 1901, when she went over the horse shoe falls in a barrel.
