"THE UNITED STATES AND MEXICO. - In another column may be found the manifesto of Paredes, which, under the circumstances, may he considered tantamount to a declaration of war by Mexico against the United States .-The document is well drawn up, and makes the most of a bad case; for bad it certainly is on the part of Mexico. What are the leading facts of the case? Briefly these: That prior to the annexation of Texas to the United States, Mexico announced to the latter that the consummation of that measure would be considered by her as casus belli; that this threat of war by Mexico has been continually repeated ever since: that the government of the United States was thus compelled by Maxico to send an armed force to Texas to protect it from the threatened invasion; that we have a just claim of long standing against Mexico amounting to not less than six millions of dollars for wanon spoliations committed by her on the property of our citizens, which she will not pay, and that under these circumstances she refused to receive, after having promised to do to, a minister from the United States who was clothed with full power to arrange a settlement of all the difficulties between the two countries! Now, after all this, we should lke to know what other alternative remained the United States, but to proceed forthwith to right themselvs by force of arms?-Granting the question of the Texas boundary to be a disputed one, how was it to be adjusted after Mexico refused to receive our ministers? We claimed up to the Rio Grande. She claimed all Texas, but contented herself for the present with ordering our army on the Rio rande to fall back beyond the Nueces, and commencing war upon it because the order who not obeyed. Taking the country between he Nucces and the Rio Grande as disputed country, and assuming, for the sake of argunient, our title not to be 'clear and unques-tionable,' we maintain, we had a clear and urquestionable right to take possession of it and hold it, after Mexico had cut offall negotistion by refusing, in terms of contumely and insult, to receive our minister. What under coercive measure could the United States have possibly adopted, than to send an army to take possession of the disputed territory, and to protect from apprehended and openly threatened invasion not only the DISPUTED territory, but ALL OF TEXAS, one of the sovereign States of the Union? "But it is alledged, that the question of

boundary being a disputed one, Mr. Polk ought not to have sent an army to the Rio Grande without consulting Congress. Well, suppose this to be so, what bearing can it have between Mexico and the United States the question we are now arguing? We assume, and we challenge ANY MAN OF ANY FARTY to controvert the assumption, that MEXICO HAD PURSUED A COURSE TOWARDS THE UNITED STATES which rendered it IMPERA-TIVE upon the latter to FORCE her to a settlement of the grave difficulties existing beween the two countries; and we assume faret, that the very mildest coercive measure that could be resorted to for that purpose was that of ordering our army to the Rio Grande, with strict orders, as were Gen. Taylor's, no to treat Mexico "as an enemy, unless she herself, should commence hostilities." The inited States, being under the NECESSITY of adopting coercive measures towards Mexico, and the measure of sending on an army to the Rio Grande being in our opinion, as good and proper a one, under the circumstances, could be reserted to, it can make no possible difference with Mexico with which department of our government the measure originated. She has no just grounds of complaint. apposing the fact to be, as alle led by some, that the President had no right to assume hat the Rio Grande was the true boundary, and that was a question about which Congress


